# SUNDAY OF THE MYRRH-BEARING WOMEN

Christ is Risen!

Dear brothers and sisters!

Today we remember with special reverence all the holy myrrh-bearing women. The ministry of women in the Ancient Church took on a special form. It was expressed in caring for the good upbringing of children and caring for orphans and the sick. Known for their righteous lives, deaconesses helped elders prepare people for the sacrament of Baptism.

The first Christian communities already had women around them who performed charity, cared for the needs of others, and aided in Christian preaching. Their feat of evangelism aroused the approval of the Gentiles. Yes, one of them, the teacher of St. John Chrysostom, in a fit of approval, exclaimed: "What women are Christians!"

On that first Easter morning, as they approached the tomb, the myrrh-bearing women saw the Heavenly Herald in white robes, who said, "Do not be afraid, for I know that you seek Jesus crucified. He is not here. He is risen. Come up, look at the place where the Lord lay." (Matthew 28:5-6) "But go and tell his disciples and Peter that he will be before you in Galilee; there you will see Him." (Mk.16:7)

Many people surrounded the Savior. He had many disciples, but in the last moments of His earthly life very few were near Him. Holy women, from different places, all had one thing in common - this is love for God! Love is so strong, so overflowing in their hearts, that from the point of view of an ordinary person, not engulfed in the flame of love for God, their actions had no meaning. Even from the point of view of everyday life they are devoid of any meaning.

And in today's Gospel, regarding our heart, which is the image of the tomb of the Lord, there is one main question: Who will roll away the stone from the doors of our tomb? Who will make it so that in our heart, as in that very tomb, Christ dwells? The Angel of the Lord was there, and the myrrh-bearing women saw him, and he gave them the good news of the Resurrection of Christ. Here, with us, the Savior Himself strives to enter into our hearts, but only our will is that stone that is very difficult to roll away; we must open our own will towards the Risen Christ.

Once a family spent a vacation by the sea. Parents sunbathed, and children bathed in the sea and built sand castles. Suddenly a grandmother appeared nearby. She was very poorly dressed and untidy, her gray hair fluttering in the wind. She constantly whispered something about herself and leaned over again and again, lifting something out of the sand and putting it in her bag. The parents called the children to them and told them to stay away from her. Grandmother passed by, collecting something on the sand, nodded her head and smiled, but the man replied rudely: "Go your own way. Don't come near us." That evening, their son wounded his leg severely with a piece of broken glass on the beach. At the hospital, they learned that this grandmother had been collecting the remains of broken glass on the beach for many years, so that the children who play there would not cut themselves.

We often do this: we insult and persecute those who do us mercy, because charity seems to us something strange and meaningless. Meanwhile, it is charity that gives our lives a true and profound meaning.

Congratulations today to all our Myrrh-bearing women on this holiday, which is rightly called the day of Christian women. A low bow to those women who, despite the hard working week, hurry to the temple of God on Sundays and holidays. Great praise to the mothers and grandmothers who patiently instilled love for the Church in their children and grandchildren. We wish you, dear women, health, peace, joy, family comfort and blessings for all your good deeds.
