# Lazarus and the Rich Man

In the 1940's, France was known for it's extensive collection of Egyptian artifacts. Many forgotten treasures were holed up in the basement of a Paris museum. One day, some workmen uncovered a forgotten burial case pushed into a dark corner of the basement. They decided that the box would be an excellent storage container for many of the smaller artifacts. So, without consulting any of the museum authorities, the workmen took it upon themselves to empty the contents of the box into the sewer. They then filled the empty box with odds and ends. Some time later, they made the unhappy discovery that they had mistakenly discarded the remains of Cleopatra, one of the most famous women of ancient Egypt!

In ignorance, people regularly discard things of great value. One of the more valuable

things that people discard are opportunities. We see this in today's Gospel reading of the Parable of Lazarus and the Rich Man. The rich man had everything he needed in the world, while Lazarus was in constant need. Each day, the rich man had the opportunity to attend to the need of Lazarus who wanted nothing more than to eat the crumbs which fell from his table. The rich man, for his part, never abused Lazarus or mistreated him – his simply ignored him and for this he was condemned. The sin of the rich man was not his welath, it was his blindness – blindness to the needs of others.

Let us not forget that "the truly rich man is not one who possesses much, but one who gives much." (Saint John Chrysostom)

Remember, my son, that you have received your blessings during your life, and it was Lazarus who experienced many misfortunes. So now he is happy here, and you are suffering (Luke 16:19-31).

#### Dear Brothers and Sisters!

Today, we heard about the parable of a rich man and Lazarus, which illuminates the carefree and luxurious life of one and the poor and unhappy life of another. When death comes, everything that was here in temporary existence comes to an end. And what is next?

In this parable, the Lord does not condemn the rich for their wealth, but exposes the misuse of God's blessings. The Savior sets the example of poor Lazarus for his humility.

This Gospel parable, according to John of Kronstadt, is a good, instructive lesson for all those mad intellectuals who do not believe in the existence of human souls after death, in the true existence of eternal fire, or in the eternity of the torments of unrepentant sinners and future bliss. And indeed, very often, people do not think about the meaning of their lives, or about why they came into this world. They live without thinking about the future trial and the retribution that awaits everyone. But you and I, beloved, must remember that we owe our whole being to our Creator, He who created the whole world out of nothing, visible and invisible, and gives us both breath and life. Everything we achieve and everything we have in life is given to us by God. Unfortunately, this was forgotten by the evangelical rich man, who in spiritual inaction spent the days of his life in vain, not even noticing the suffering of poor Lazarus.

Saint Nicholas of Serbia teaches that: "The rich man went to hell not only because he was not merciful to Lazarus, but also because he set an example to his brothers by a frivolous life, and thus destroyed them, paving the way for them to hell, as well. Temptation is a terrible sin: "to slip on one's own and lead others means to deserve incomparably heavier condemnation than a person who has just slipped."

According to Blessed Theophylact, Bishop of Bulgaria: "The Lord wants to use this parable to teach us to manage well the wealth entrusted to us. First, we learn that we do not possess wealth and various possessions, because we have nothing of our own, but only manage that which is entrusted to us by our Lord. Secondly, if we do not manage wealth in the Lord's good will, then we are unworthy, careless managers, because we waste the good entrusted to us, living according to our own whims and pleasures."

A pious man had this dream: he dreamed that he had arrived at the Gates of Heaven. He came for the reward, because he fought for a long time in his life, had overcame all evil tendencies, boldly stood in defense of Christ's faith, and feared sin as the greatest misfortune. Therefore, he was convinced that he would enter the Kingdom of God. But, he saw that to each of those who came before, an angel opened a book and read something from it, and then sent some to Heaven and turned others to Hades. He did not know what it was, but then, it was his turn. Here before him, the angel opened the book and proceeded to read, but saw that nothing was written in the book. Surprised that nothing was written in his book, he asked the angel, "What is the reason?" And the angel answered him, "You see, brother, it is good that you have fought evil, so there is no sin written in your book, but there is also no good deed, so your book is not full. Did you not know that there is no use in a land that has not been cultivated by weeds and sown with good grain? Have you forgotten what the holy Apostle James said, 'Faith without works is dead?"

So, brothers and sisters, let us not be quick to evil, but be quick to good. Let us not be disappointed with evil in the world, let us not lose heart from the lack of abundance, but let us care above all for the good and joy of the soul. The Apostle Paul exhorts us to do this and gives us the following counsel: "And let us not grow weary in well-doing, for in due season we shall reap, if we do not lose heart. So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all men, and especially to those who are of the household of faith" (Gal. 6:9-10). For even the smallest good - "a glass of water," as Christ taught, will be a great treasure for the soul in heaven and a source of lasting joy. "For truly, I say to you, whoever gives you a cup of water to drink because you bear the name of Christ, means lose his reward" (Mark 9:41).

#### THE OBSERVANCE OF SUNDAY ACCORDING TO THE RUTHENIAN TRADITION: "The assistance at

**SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION:** Fr. Serhii is available 15 minutes before or immediately after Divine Liturgy to hear confession.


