"ASK THE DEACON" - THIS WEEK'S QUESTION: With Thanksgiving Day approaching, why and how should we give thanks?

ANSWER: Thanksgiving days have been proclaimed by presidents as far back as George Washington. The custom of celebrating it as we do now, on the 4th Thursday of November, appears to have been started by President Abraham Lincoln in the year 1863. Our Divine Liturgy is also known as the Holy Eucharist, and the word *eucharist* in Greek means *thanksgiving*. Our most profound act of worship, where we become the church, the body of Christ in the most visible way, that act of worship is to celebrate and partake of a thanksgiving meal from the Holy Table within the Altar. This thanksgiving meal of our worship is so essential to our spirituality that it should affect our outlook for all our meals not just those for special occasions; it should overflow into our everyday life. We should eat our meals as celebrations and we should eat them theologically. We can sanctify our meals simply by allowing God to be present - implicitly by the awareness of wanting to do so, by our conduct and conversation and the fellowship we have at our meals, by the love for one another we have as Christians, by an awareness of those in need, who may have nothing to eat – an awareness that goes beyond just a pious thought to actually helping those in need. May it be as we pray: The poor will eat and be satisfied and those who seek the Lord will want for no good thing; His praise will forever be in their mouth ... We thank You Christ our God for You have satisfied us with the good things of Your earth. Do not deprive us of your heavenly kingdom but as You appeared to your disciples, O Savior, granting them peace, come also to us and save us. Amen.
