

Byzantine Catholic Eparchy of Passaic Fasting Regulations for the Great Fast 2024

Abstinence: The law of Abstinence forbids the use of meat, permitting the use of eggs and dairy products. All the faithful of the Eparchy who receive Holy Communion are obliged to abstain. Abstinence is to be observed on all Wednesdays and Fridays during the Holy Season of the Great Fast.

Strict Abstinence: The law of Strict Abstinence (Fast) forbids the use of meat, eggs, and dairy products. All the adult faithful of the Eparchy who receive Holy Communion are obliged to observe Strict Abstinence, and is to be observed on the First Day of the Great Fast, Pure Monday, February 12th, and on Great and Holy Friday, March 29th.

THE PRAYER OF ST. EPHREM:


Lord and Master of my life, spare me from the spirit of indifference, despair, lust for power, and idle chatter.

The Great (Holy) Week, in the Byzantine Church, is considered as a "special week," and is not included in the Forty-Days Fast. Reflection from Mount St. Macrina, Uniontown, PA By: Sister Barbara Jean Mihalchick, OSBM Sisters of St. Basil the Great

Glory to Jesus Christ!

We continue now with the Sixth Commandment: "Thou shall not commit adultery."

It's helpful to remember the Covenant atmosphere covering the relationship that is implied in the background of the Commandments; the first three being about that Covenant with God. If we claim that God is first in our lives, which is what the Commandments invite, then, indeed, we will show that God is first in our lives and we do things accordingly, like respect His name and go to worship together.

The last seven Commandments are about, you might say, "The Golden Rule." How do we love one another? How do we respect this Covenant in which we share by the proper treatment of one another?

"Love" is especially the context of some of these Commandments. Here is the Sixth: "Thou shall not commit adultery." A great honor is paid to marriage in the Church; to a loving relationship and the role of marriage as a way to build up both family and society.

God created us, man and woman, with equal dignity and He called us to acknowledge and accept our sexuality. We're called to "chastity," a word that would mean living love purely, living love for one another, according to one's state in life.

Christ is the model of chastity and it is from Him we can receive as we pray for help to live this life. The Church acknowledges that growing in chastity is a lifelong process and the Sacrament of Confession is there to help us because we fall and rise up again and again.

The Church does not name certain things that are against the Commandments of love: fornication, pornography, sexual activity among people who are not married to each other.

The Marriage Covenant always call the people to faithful love and to not sin against the dignity of marriage. It's very special. It's an imitation of the Fatherhood of God, an imitation of love shared in the Holy Trinity. Adultery, therefore, would be against marriage and the Commandment. Divorce is also, as is polygamy and free union; in fact, any ways we make a marriage difficult to keep works against the Covenant and the bond.

In truth, certain things cannot be worked out and some marriages aren't saved. However, the Church calls us to that highest expression of love, service, and imitation of our loving God; seek the Church's help.

Icons Show the Human Face of God

In recent months my Sunday reflections have frequently focused on our Christian brothers and sisters of the East. Wishing as it were to embrace their rich tradition of faith in a single glance, today I would like to refer once again to the sense of mystery which is apparent in their icons. The East and the West vie with each other to put their art at the service of the faith.

But from the East, where icons had to be defended with bloodshed in the iconoclast crisis of the eighth and ninth centuries, comes a particular call jealously to preserve the religious nature of this art. It is based on the mystery of the Incarnation, in which God chose to assume a human face. In the last analysis, sacred art seeks to transmit something of the mystery of that face.

This is why the East firmly insists on the spiritual qualities which must characterize the artist,

to whom Simeon of Thessalonica, the great defender of Tradition, addresses this important exhortation: "Teach with words, write with letters, paint with colors, in conformity with Tradition; the painting is true, as is the writing of books; and the grace of God is present in them, because what is represented there is holy."

By contemplating icons in the whole context of liturgical and ecclesial life, the Christian community is called to grow in its experience of God, and to become more and more a living icon of the communion of life between the Three Divine Persons.
