

MYSTERY OF REPENTANCE: Confession is available beginning an hour before Divine Liturgy, and ending 15 minutes before the start of services. Fr. Vasyl will also be having confession on Thursday, March 21st, from 5-7pm.

HOLY COMMUNION AND VISITATION OF THE SICK: Holy Communion can be brought to parishioners who are ill, in the hospital, or at home. If you would like to receive Communion, or a visit by either Fr. Vasyl, or Deacon Tony, you can send the church an email or contact either one.

LITURGY INTENTIONS: It is a beautiful part of our Byzantine Catholic tradition to have the Divine Liturgy celebrated for a special intention or for health and God's blessings upon a living person, or for the repose of the soul of a deceased person. A special date may be requested, but it may not always be available. The date is assigned on a first come, first served basis, and are reserved upon receipt of the offering. **We currently have some dates open, if you would like to request an intention!**

Byzantine Catholic Eparchy of Passaic Fasting Regulations for the Great Fast 2024

Abstinence: The law of Abstinence forbids the use of meat, permitting the use of eggs and dairy products. All the faithful of the Eparchy who receive Holy Communion are obliged to abstain. Abstinence is to be observed on all Wednesdays and Fridays during the Holy Season of the Great Fast.

Strict Abstinence: The law of Strict Abstinence (Fast) forbids the use of meat, eggs, and dairy products. All the adult faithful of the Eparchy who receive Holy Communion are obliged to observe Strict Abstinence, and is to be observed on the First Day of the Great Fast, Pure Monday, February 12th, and on Great and Holy Friday, March 29th.

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Reflection from Mount St. Macrina, Uniontown, PA By: Sister Barbara Jean Mihalchick, OSBM

The Seventh Commandment: Let us reflect, love, serve

Glory to Jesus Christ!

As we continue to work through the Commandments, I noted the last seven are about love for one another This one, the Seventh, says, "You shall not steal." Of course, respecting others would include respecting what they treasure — that is their rights, their possessions — in the same measure that we want to be respected and have our rights and possessions respected.

Like "thou shall not kill," this is for the good order of a society. Remember that this doesn't mean just stealing; it means cheating. The positive side includes being faithful in contracts, paying a just wage, practicing justice and charity in business relationships and every day relationships.

The injustices that are committed here in the Seventh Commandment, though, the Church teaches and expects, that part of the forgiveness there must be reparation. There must be restitution. Pay back what you have taken away from another.

However, the Church's idea of stealing goes even further. It calls us to respect the rights of others and it includes the social doctrines of the Church. So, think broadly about our relationships with finances, with law, with political matters. It's the section that calls us to awareness of the poor and care for the poor; helping them to improve their economic situations, helping them to be lifted up. This first of all requires justice but also charity.

The Seventh Commandment absolutely forbids the taking of persons, the enslavement of persons for commercial reasons or for totalitarian reasons. Human slavery of any sort is, of course, against this Commandment.

The Church cares about the social and economic fundamental rights of the person as much as it cares about the salvation of souls. Everyone should have that common good in mind. "Love one another" as Jesus has taught us.

The Seventh Commandment also includes a proper love for creation. A few years ago, Pope Francis wrote the document about this and calls us to be truly careful and mindful of how we affect the world around us; how we together need to respect what is necessary for life on this planet and in that document, he calls us also to change our behaviors where we may become aware that they are excessive or destructive in some way.

This Commandment also talks about work. Work can be redemptive. It's a necessary part of human life and it allows us to participate truly in the sense of the work of creation – God's work of creation. For this, I often suggest to people that they make a prayer of intention in the morning; we often call it the morning offering. Set your day unto the work and the glory of the Lord. Bring His good into this world.

Giving alms to the poor is a witness of fraternal charity and one woven all through the teachings of Jesus. In this Commandment, let us become aware all the more where that fits in our lives and remember the words of Jesus and the Last Judgment: "What you did not do for others, you did not do for me. What you did for others, you did for me."

Come, let us reflect, love, and serve. God bless you.

1924 CENTENNIAL 2024 - Establishment of the Byzantine Ruthenian Church Exarchate in the United States. The Ruthenian Exarchate was established on February 25, 1924. Pope Pius XI appointed Most Reverend Basil Takach, D.D., as the first Byzantine-Ruthenian Bishop in the United States on May 20, 1924. He arrived at New York Harbor on August 13, 1924, on the liner RMS Mauretania and offered a Moleben of Thanksgiving at St. Mary of the Protection Church, New York City. A *Jubilee Weekend Celebration will take place October 12-13, 2024, in Washington D.C. and Annandale, VA.* More details to follow.



Conventional Wisdom and the Lord's

Listen, friend, it's a dog-eat-dog world out there. You've got to do it to them before they do it to you. But it cannot be like that with you ...



Preparing a Traditional Easter Basket



Among the Slavs, especially Ruthenians and Ukrainians, the custom of bringing an Easter Basket to Church on Easter Sunday is an age old tradition. It stems from the desire of the Christian community to ask God's blessing on the foods that will break the Great Fast (Lent) and from which they have abstained during this period. The religious significance attached to the foods is symbolic of Christ Himself, our true Passover (Pascha). The foods prohibited during Lent, meat and dairy products, naturally become the main staple during the festive time of the Easter celebration.

We have listed the items traditionally placed in a wicker basket and brought to the Church for the Easter Matins after which a grand blessing takes place. The people then take their foods home to be enjoyed by the whole family. It should be noted that if you have abstained from these foods during Lent, and especially Holy Week, they will taste better on Easter Sunday.

PASCHA (PAS-ka)

The Easter Bread. A sweet, yeast bread rich in eggs. butter, etc. Symbolic of Christ Himself who is our True Bread. Usually a round loaf baked with a golden crust decorated with a symbol indicative of Christ. Sometimes a cross (†) of dough is placed on top encircled by a plait (giving it a crowned effect) or Greek abbreviations for the name of Christ, namely IXC, XP, IC XC which stand for the word Christ in Greek. The letters XB Христос Воскрес (Khrystos Voskres) - the Slavonic for Christ is Risen.

HRUDKA or SIRETS (HROOD-ka, sir-ETS)



A custard-type cheese shaped into a ball having a rather bland but sweet taste, indicative of the moderation that Christians should have in all things. Also, creamed cheese is placed in a small dish and both are decorated with symbols (see Pascha) out of cloves or peppercorns.

MASLO (MAS-loh)



Butter, the favorite dairy product, is shaped into a figure of a Lamb or small cross and decorated in the same manner as the cheese. It reminds us of the goodness of Christ that we should have toward all things.

KOLBASSI or KOLBASA (kol-BAH-si, kol-ba-SA) A spicy, garlic seasoned sausage of pork products (also known as kielbasa), indicative of God's favor and generosity.



SUNKA or SHYNKA (SHOON-ka, SHIN-ka)

Ham, the flesh meat popular with the Slavs as the main dish because of its richness is symbolic of the great joy and abundance of Easter. Some may prefer lamb or veal. This is usually well roasted or cooked as well as other meats so that the festivity of the day will not be burdened with preparation and all may enjoy the Feast.



SLANINA or SOLONYNA (sla-NI-na, so-lo-NI-na A piece of uncooked bacon cured with spices. Symbolic of the overabundance of God's mercy to us.



PISANKI or PYSANKY (PI-san-ki)

Eggs brightly decorated with symbols and markings done by a wax-resist process. Indicative of new life and resurrection.



KRASHANKY (KRA-shan-ki)

Hard-boiled eggs dyed a single bright color which will be used to first break the fast, and the sharing of one egg shows family unity and hope for a good life in the year ahead.



SOL or SIL (pronounced with a soft 1)

Salt, a condiment necessary for flavor reminding the Christian of his duty to others.



CHRIN or KHRIN

Horseradish, which is often mixed with grated red beets. Symbolic of the Passion of Christ still in our minds - the bitter-sweet red colored mixture reminds us of the sufferings of Christ. It is sweetened with a bit of sugar because of the Resurrection.

These items are placed in a wicker basket and a ribbon or bow is tied to the handle. A decorated candle is placed in the basket and is lit at the time of blessing. A linen cover, usually embroidered with the words "Christ is Risen" or a picture or symbol of the Risen Christ is placed over the food when brought to the Church.

In some places a large Pascha (Easter Bread) is made and brought separately in a large linen cloth. Also, a sweet wine may be brought if the origin of the people was from a wine growing area.

Easter Recipes

PASCHA -EASTER BREAD

2 cakes household yeast 6 eggs
1/2 cup lukewarm water 3/4 cup shortening
2 tablespoons sugar 3/4 cup sugar
1 quart scalded milk 1 tablespoon salt
12 cups flour

Dissolve yeast in lukewarm water with 2 tablespoons sugar. Stir in lukewarm milk and 1/2 of the flour. Place in greased bowl and let rise for about 8 minutes.

Add eggs, shortening, 3/4 cup sugar, salt and remainder of flour. Knead until smooth (about 9 minutes). Let rise again until double in bulk (about 1-1/2 to 2 hours).

Set aside some dough for decoration. Shape remaining dough in round loaf in baking pans. Decorate with symbol using dough which was set aside. Brush with beaten egg. Bake at 350°.

HRUDKA - EASTER CHEESE

2 dozen eggs 1 quart milk 1 teaspoon vanilla 1/2 cup sugar

Beat eggs; add milk, sugar, and vanilla and beat well. Cook in double boiler until mixture forms curds and only water remains. Pour into a cheesecloth sack, squeeze and tie tightly. Shape and hang up to drain. Refrigerate.

CHRIN - HORSERADISH

1 can whole red beets +/- 2 tablespoons sugar
1/2 bottle horseradish (not creamed) 1 tablespoon lemon juice

Drain the beets and grate finely. Add 1/2 bottle of horseradish. Add sugar to taste and lemon juice. Refrigerate.
