

A special date may be requested, but it may not always be available. The date is assigned on a first come, first served basis, and are reserved upon receipt of the offering. **We currently have some dates open, if you would like to request an intention!**

1924 CENTENNIAL 2024 - Establishment of the Byzantine Ruthenian Church Exarchate in the United States. The Ruthenian Exarchate was established on February 25, 1924. Pope Pius XI appointed Most Reverend Basil Takach, D.D., as the first Byzantine-Ruthenian Bishop in the United States on May 20, 1924. He arrived at New York Harbor on August 13, 1924, on the liner RMS Mauretania and offered a Moleben of Thanksgiving at St. Mary of the Protection Church, New York City. A *Jubilee Weekend Celebration will take place October 12-13*, 2024, in Washington D.C. and Annandale, VA. More details to follow.

Christ is risen and life is freed from the ancestral curse.


Christ is risen and the graves and tombs empty their dead.

WELCOME TO OUR PARISH: We welcome all new visitors, to our parish family, and are happy you are joining us to share in the celebration of the Divine Liturgy and hope you will become an active part of our parish community. We receive the Body and Blood of Christ in our mouth by spoon; please DO NOT stick out your tongue. All Catholics may receive the Eucharist if you are in good-standing and prepared. If you would like to be added to our parish email list, send us an email at patronage.church@gmail.com. If you want to make us your home church, parish registration is the OFFICIAL way we join a church. Simply complete a census form that is located either on the bookrack in the Narthex, or can be found on our website, and either mail it to the church, or place it in the collection basket in the back of our Temple. Donation information can be found under "Stewardship" in this bulletin. "My house shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples" (Isaiah 56:7).

DID YOU EVERY WONDER WHY:

- 1. we place a Pascha (Artos) on the tomb after Resurrection Matins? "Artos" is Greek and means "bread." It reminds us that the Lord Jesus is the "Bread of Life." As He said, "I am the living Bread which came down from heaven; if any one eats of this bread, he will live forever; and the bread which I shall give for the life of the world is my flesh" (John 6:51). This loaf of leavened bread that is blessed during services remains in the church, at the tomb, throughout Bright Week, recalling Christ, the Bread of Life, among His Apostles. It is customary that the bread is distributed to the faithful on St. Thomas Sunday. Today, Artos is still a symbol of the invisible presence of Christ in our lives.
- 2. we see the letters "XB" during the Paschal season, and what do they represent? The Easter bread, Pascha, pronounced (Pa-ska), is a sweet yeast bread rich in eggs, butter, etc., and is symbolic of Christ Himself who is our True Bread. Usually, a round loaf baked with a golden crust decorated with a symbol indicative of Christ. Sometimes a cross of dough is placed on top encircled by a plait giving it a crowned effect or Greek abbreviation for the name of Christ. The letters XB indicate the Slavonic for "Christ is Risen."
- eggs are one of the most symbolic and beautiful Paschal-Easter customs? It is the practice of preparing, giving, and eating eggs. Most seem to take for granted the idea of eggs at Holy Pascha. There is the fun in boiling and coloring them, even more enjoyment in giving them to relatives and friends, and cracking the eggs by hitting them one upon the other as the greeting of the Holy Feast is said: "Christ is Risen!" However, the real enjoyment of the Paschal eggs comes only when the symbolism is realized and its connection to Holy Pascha. The egg itself is a symbol of the Resurrection - while being dormant it contains a new life sealed within its walls. The idea of the egg as a symbol of fertility and of renewed life goes way back to the ancient Egyptians and Persians who had the custom of coloring and eating eggs during their spring festivities. This ancient idea of the significance of the egg as a symbol of new life readily became the symbol of the Resurrection of Christ to the people of the early Christian Church. In Christianity the Paschal egg represents the sealed tomb in which the Precious Body of Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ was placed after His Crucifixion - the shell being the sealed tomb having dormant life within its walls. There are varied explanations of the significance of red eggs. One is Mary Magdalene, after seeing the empty tomb on that first Pascha morning, went to the Roman Emperor to tell him the news of Christ's Resurrection. Although the emperor already knew, he challenged her that he would believe the claim if the eggs in a basket near him turned "red," which they did instantaneously. Another one is the eggs turned "red" from the tears of the Virgin Mary at the foot of the cross.



Celebrating Holy and Great Pascha

Brethren, how fine a thing it is to move from festival to festival, from prayer to prayer, from holy day to holy day. The time is now at hand when we enter on a new beginning: the proclamation of the blessed Passover, in which the Lord was sacrificed. We feed as on the food of life, we constantly refresh our souls with His precious blood, as from a fountain. Yet we are always thirsting, burning to be satisfied. But He Himself is present for those who thirst and in His goodness invites them to the feast day. Our Savior repeats His words: If anyone thirsts, let him come to me and drink.

He quenched the thirst not only of those who came to him then. Whenever anyone seeks him He is freely admitted to the presence of the Savior. The grace of the feast is not restricted to one occasion. Its rays of glory never set. It is always at hand to enlighten the mind of those who desire it. Its power is always there for those whose minds have been enlightened and who meditate day and night on the holy Scriptures, like the one who is called blessed in the holy psalm: Blessed is the man who has not followed the counsel

of the wicked, or stood where sinners stand, or sat in the seat of the scornful, but whose delight is in the law of the Lord, and who meditates on his law day and night.

Moreover, my friends, the God who first established this feast for us allows us to celebrate it each year. He who gave up His Son to death for our salvation, from the same motive gives us this feast, which is commemorated every year. This feast guides us through the trials that meet us in this world. God now gives us the joy of salvation that shines out from this feast, as He brings us together to form one assembly, uniting us all in spirit in every place, allowing us to pray together and to offer common thanksgiving, as is our duty on the feast. Such is the wonder of His love: He gathers to this feast those who are far apart, and brings together in unity of faith those who may be physically separated from each other.

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

Episcopal Ordination and Enthronement of Bishop Robert M. Pipta



On Wednesday, 8 November 2023, during the Divine Liturgy, after the Trisagion Hymn, Fr. Robert Pipta knelt before the Holy Table, touching his forehead to it. The co-consecrating bishops in succession from the Holy Apostles opened and laid the Gospel Book, with the writing facing him, to acknowledge that his special role as bishop is to preach and teach the Gospel, and to ordain others. As the three bishops placed their hands on his head and the Gospel Book, and said the Prayer of Consecration, the Holy Spirit descended upon Fr. Robert, imparting the grace of the Episcopate upon him; and thus, Bishop Robert was ordained, and enthroned, as the sixth Bishop of the Byzantine Ruthenian Eparchy of Parma, Ohio. He had previously served with faith and leadership as our Seminary's rector from 2014 to 2023. May God grant to his newly ordained servant, Bishop Robert, peace, health and happiness for many years! Glory to Jesus Christ!


Dear friends and benefactors:
