

Sunday of the Apostle Thomas

Christ is Risen! Dear Brothers and Sisters!

After the Resurrection, Jesus Christ repeatedly appeared to His disciples, especially, when they had some need. He could enter even when the door of their house was locked. In our present, no matter what situation we find ourselves in, no matter what misfortunes we experience, we should not despair, but we can also hope in our Savior.

Christ convinced two disciples on the way to Emmaus, who at first did not recognize Him. He confirmed Thomas in faith, who doubted His Resurrection. He calmed the apostles when they, being afraid of the Jews, locked themselves in the upper room. He helped the disciples to catch fish in the Sea of Tiberias. Likewise, He will help us in all our needs, comfort us in sorrow, instruct us in hesitation, calm us in disagreements, if we will love Him, believe in Him, and hope in Him.

When the Lord appeared to His disciples for the first time on the day of His Resurrection, by God's providence, Thomas was not with them. When Thomas returned, the apostles, announcing great joy, began to tell him about the resurrected Lord, but these words seemed to Thomas to be fiction. He could not believe that Christ had risen and appeared to them here, in the house, and even with the door closed. This astonishment led to the fact that Thomas said, "...Unless I see in his hands the print of the nails, and place my finger in the mark of the nails, and place my hand in His side, I will not believe" (John 20:25). And eight days after that, Jesus appeared to His disciples again. This time Thomas was with them. "Then he said to Thomas, 'Put your finger here, and see my hands; and put out your hand, and place it in my side...'" (John 20: 27).

Embarrassed, Thomas, in awe, did not know what to do. His soul, which so desired to be convinced of the truth of Christ's Resurrection, suddenly received even more. The Lord Himself now addressed him, as if exposing him, "...do not be faithless but believing" (John 20:27). And now any doubt disappeared in his soul and heart, and he was filled with such joy that it caused Thomas to exclaim, "My Lord and my God" (John 20: 28)!

That is why the Holy Church calls the unbelief of Thomas "good unbelief. "Jesus said to him, 'You have believed because you have seen me. Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe'" (John 20:29). This, dear brothers and sisters, is the greatest praise of faith. After all, our salvation depends on faith. Jesus Christ himself said, "He who believes and is baptized will be saved; but he who does not believe will be condemned" (Mk. 16:16).

"The basis of faith," Saint Macarius the Great teaches, "is spiritual poverty and immortal love for God." To be faithful to God, it is not enough to simply believe in His existence and call yourself a believer because of that. "You believe that God is one; you do well. Even the demons believe--and shudder," says the holy Apostle

James (James 2:19). And Reverend Mark Podvizhnyk says, "Faith consists not only in being baptized in the name of Christ, but also in obeying His commandments." Reverend Ephrem Syrin adds, "The firmness of our faith is not revealed when we are served and we listen to words of praise, or when we endure suffering." Only a pure soul can be filled with sincere and pure faith, only such a soul can be faithful to God. Saint James the Apostle says, "...faith apart from works is barren" (James 2:20). "Faith that does not have good works," says Saint Simeon the New Theologian, "does not have God, who gives life to it, and is dead, since it does not acquire what Christ speaks about. "...If a man loves me, he will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our home with him" (John 14:23). "This is in order to raise the soul from the dead by My visitation and to renew the one who is worthy to receive it. That is why such faith is dead for those who have it without good works."

Dear believers! Each of us aspires to follow salvation and achieve eternal bliss. There is not a single person who does not wish for this. But not everyone does everything possible to earn God's eternal benefits. In order to get warm, it is not important for us to know how the sun shines. Rather, we need to be under its beneficial rays. Similarly, in spiritual life, there is no need to look for an answer to the questions about where God comes from or whether He really exists. Rather, it is necessary to sincerely and firmly believe in Him, to fulfill His commandments, and to draw closer to Him with our holy life. Therefore, we should remember the words of St. John Chrysostom, "There is no benefit from a healthy faith in a corrupt life."



Our Exodus, Our Passover

We have been released not from physical but from spiritual bondage. We have been freed not from earthly labor but from worldly defilement. Our flight has not been from Egyptian taskmasters, nor from a godless and savage tyrant who is nonetheless a human being like ourselves, but from wicked and unclean demons who urge us to sin and from their commander, who is Satan himself.

We have passed through the sea of this present life with its pleasures and idle distractions. We have eaten spiritual manna, the bread from heaven which gives life to the world. We have drunk water from the rock, for we have found our delight in the spiritual stream flowing from Christ. By the grace of holy baptism we have crossed the Jordan and entered the land promised to the saints and worthy of them, the land the Savior himself

spoke of when He said: "Blessed are the gentle, for they shall inherit the land."

Therefore, in honor of a new happening a new hymn should be sung by the Lord's kingdom, that is, by those subject to Him and governed by Him. A hymn should be sung, worthy praise should be given, not only in the land of the Jews but from one end of the earth to the other; in other words, everywhere in the world. Of old God was known in Judaea and His name was great only in Israel, but now that we have been called by Christ to the knowledge of the truth and His glory fills all heaven and earth, fulfilling the prophecy of the Psalmist: "The whole earth shall be full of his glory."
