

This icon depicts the biblical story of Christ healing the man who was blind since birth. Our Lord is shown placing the clay on the eyes of the man. He is with His disciples who are questioning Christ about the source of the man's affliction. The blind man is shown with his hand outstretched toward Christ expressing his faith and willingness to receive healing and grace from the Son of God. Our Lord has in His hand a scroll, which directs us to His statements, "I am the light of the world," (John 9:5), and "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to preach good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed," (Luke 4:18). The scroll may also represent the role of Christ as Judge. Jesus said, "For judgment I came into this world, that those who do not see may see, and that those who see may become blind" (John 9:39).

Dear Brothers and Sisters!

Today we celebrate Mother's Day. Motherhood is a wonderful feeling. A mother not only gives life to a child, but also protects him throughout his life. A sensitive heart and tender love, caring attitude and self-sacrifice - these are the feelings with which every mother cherishes her child.

You all have probably heard the familiar story about the mother's bill. One day, when my mother was washing the dishes, her young son came up to her and handed her a bill in which he made his demands for the services rendered: I shopped 3 times, cleaned the kitchen 3 times, wiped the dishes 5 times, cleaned my shoes 7 times, 4 laid the table twice, made the bed twice, took care of my younger sister once, etc. The mother read the bill, looked at her son, wiped her hands on the apron and wrote a note on the back: for the 9 months that I carried you under my heart, for all the sleepless nights, for washing your diapers, for wiping your tears, for carrying you in my arms, for reading fairy tales, for cooking, cleaning, I don't give you an account for all this, because everything I did for you, I did it out of love and I ask no reward for it.

They say that a mother's love is the most perfect image of God's love. That is, it is love that precedes us; that is, we do not need to somehow earn or claim it. She is here before us. A mother's love - is not selfish love. Gives quietly, imperceptibly, silently and without the right to reward.

It is also the mother's fate to see the peaks of happiness and the deep sorrow of her children's hearts. Teach a child to walk, talk, love. But also letting her go, watching her go the wrong way, or feeling her pain. Sometimes to get a kiss on the cheek, and sometimes even a blow to the soul.

Elder Paisius (Паїсій) says: "A woman's heart becomes useless if the love that a woman has in her being does not find a way out. Look: another woman can have five, six or even eight children. She may not have a penny in her heart, but she is happy. She has both noble magnanimity and courageous fortitude. Why? Because she found her purpose."

The Apostle Paul says that a woman will be saved by bearing children if she abides in faith, love and holiness with modesty. (1 Tim. 2:14-15). The Lord called every woman to motherhood. Once upon a time, women were afraid to be childless, but today they are afraid to give birth to children. Children are a blessing from God, it is said in the Holy Scriptures: "The inheritance of the Lord is children; the fruit of the womb is a reward." Therefore, on this Sunday, when we celebrate Mother's Day, the church teaches about what a Christian mother should be. What is the essence of women's happiness in motherhood and raising children.

Mother is the soul of the family, she invests wonderful feelings of love and tenderness in her child. She bears great responsibility in her family, as our proverb confirms: one corner of the house is held by the father, and three by the mother. The father must help the mother in raising children and create suitable conditions for the wife so that she can perform her duties well.

"A child loves and respects his father. But this love for the father also increases thanks to the tenderness and warmth of the mother's love," Elder Paisius teaches.

Parents should be an example for children, because they educate not so much by words, but by their own example. The Holy Fathers teach that the family is a domestic church, where the husband should love his wife as Christ loved the Church and even gave his life for her, and the wife should love her husband.

Also, today it is worth reminding children how they should love and respect their parents. Because this is exactly what the Lord's commandment calls for: Love your father and mother.

Therefore, dear believers, on this Sunday, when we celebrate Mother's Day in our nation, the church recalls the responsibilities of motherhood and would like to congratulate all women and mothers on this beautiful day. Because everything blooms and blossoms in May, so a mother's sacrificial heart always blooms with love for her child.

Our dear mothers, let love fill your hearts! Remember that you are guardian angels in your families, in our world and in our parish family.

Jesus, save all our mothers.

Jesus' Power over Blindness

There is a blindness resulting from sickness which obscures the vision and is remedied by the passage of time. There is a blindness which is caused by some fluids and this, also, when the trouble is removed, is generally cured by the skill of medicine. From this you may know that when one is cured who has been blind from birth it is not a case of skill but of power. The Lord gave health, and He used no medicine, for the Lord Jesus healed those whom no one else had cured

What did He wish in that He who gave back life at His command bestowed health by His Word, saying to the dead: "Come forth" and Lazarus came forth from the tomb; saying to the paralytic: "Arise, take up your pallet" and the paralytic arose and began to take up the pallet on which he was carried when he was paralyzed in all his limbs. Why, I say, did He spit and make clay and spread the clay over the eyes of the blind man and say to him: "Go, wash in the pool of Siloam" (which is interpreted "sent")? So he went away and washed and began to see. What is the reason for this? An important reason, unless I am mistaken, for he whom Jesus touches sees more.

Notice at the same time His divinity and his sanctity. As the Light He touched and shed light; as Priest He fulfilled in the figure of baptism the mysteries of spiritual grace. He spat so that you might realize that the things within Christ are light. One who is cleansed by the means which Christ uses truly sees. His spittle cleanses and so does His Word.
