

Sunday of the Samaritan Woman

Dear Brothers and Sisters! Christ is Risen!

In today's Gospel, we heard the story of the meeting of the Samaritan woman with Jesus. A special gem in Jesus' dialogue with the Samaritan woman is the tender and delicate tone of the dialogue, based on the gentle and merciful love of God.

Jesus Christ, with all the love of his soul and a gentle word, gently touched the soul of the Samaritan woman, helped her to know the true God, to free herself from the bondage of sin, to feel free and happy. In the conversation with the Samaritan woman, the Lord said to her, "...If you knew the gift of God (that is, the great grace of God that God sent you in this meeting) and who it is that is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked Him, and He would have given you living water" (Jn. 4:10).

The Savior calls his Divine teaching living water. Just as water saves a thirsty person from death, so His Divine teaching about God's love saves a person from eternal death and leads to eternal blessed life. The peculiarity of the Divine teaching of Christ the Savior is God's love, which is characterized above all by gentleness and mercy towards every person.

Today, in the Gospel reading, we heard how our Lord, in a conversation with a Samaritan woman, revealed incredible truths to us in simple language, "Whoever drinks the water that I will give him will never thirst;" "God is Spirit...," and so forth. In this way, the Lord broke many stereotypes of His contemporaries regarding the attitude of God to humanity. However, we do not even see the many stereotypes prevalent in our time that the Lord continues to destroy. The Savior talks to a Samaritan woman, communicates with the one with whom orthodox Jews did not communicate. The Lord talks to the one who "had five husbands", whom everyone perceived as a sinner, but the Lord did not reject her, thus showing His Divine love.

The Samaritan woman, going to the well, did the usual work every day to collect the water so necessary for life. Christ came unexpectedly and, being God, saw in the soul of the Samaritan woman that she would be a light for the other Samaritans. Her very name, which we know from tradition was Photinia, means "light." Her soul was illuminated by the light of the revelation of the Messiah, and she enlightened her compatriots, announcing the One who is to come.

There is a special type of palm that grows in the hot sands of the desert. It absorbs moisture from the air, retains it in itself, and then irrigates the earth around it in the form of refreshing dew. For this reason, you can always find other vegetation near such a palm tree. The gathering of such palm trees forms a whole oasis. Despite the fact that the sky does not give rain and the rivers dry up, this life-giving plant does not stop its functions - it absorbs moisture from the air and irrigates the soil around it with moisture. This tree itself lives and creates life around itself. The true Christian soul is something similar. The true Christian soul receives the Grace of God from Heaven, feeds on it, and draws strength from it. It then lives happily and teaches other people to live happily.

Dear believers! The Gospel reading teaches us to be careful, because Christ will come at a time we do not know. So let us always be ready to receive Him in our homes, and in our souls.



Good Advice

As sailors require winds and the storm-tossed require harbors, the time requires you to attain God. Be vigilant, like a champion of God; the prize is immortality and eternal life, in which you also believe. In all things I and my bonds, which you loved, are a substitute for you.
