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#### 8th Sunday after Pentecost

"...They need not go away; you give them something to eat" (Mt. 14:16).

#### Dear Brothers and Sisters!

Today's Gospel reading describes to us the Lord's great mercy to people and the manifestation of His divine power. We have heard many times in the Holy Scriptures how the Lord takes care of people, especially all those who were neglected, weak, poor, despised, or forgotten. We cannot list all the miracles that Christ performed on the sick, crippled, and possessed. And yet, today, we again hear the story of God's extraordinary care and mercy when we read how Jesus fed the crowd of people with only five loaves and two fish.

The evening was approaching, and no one was in a hurry to leave. Then the apostles suggested to the Savior to let the people go, so that they would not remain hungry and be able to buy bread and food for themselves. However, the Lord acted in a different way. Those who were so in need of spiritual bread received earthly bread, as well.

The Fathers of the Church say that the people should not remain mere spectators in this case, giving everyone the opportunity to receive this gift, making them participants in this miracle. Multiplying the loaves was one of the steps that the future Messiah, the King of Israel, would have to take. This act was somewhat in line with the mentality of a simple Jew, who constantly heard about those things from synagogue officials, in which the Scribes and Pharisees described what the Messiah would do. Christ saw this undisguised joy of ordinary people, who were ready even now for Him to become a leader among their people. That is why Jesus, "... made the disciples get into the boat and go before him to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds" (Mt. 14:22). We remind ourselves that before going out for a public sermon, Jesus was in the desert, where the devil tempted Him. The offer to turn a stone into bread would have made Christ much more popular among the Jewish people. But the Lord rejected this proposal, arguing, "Man shall not live by bread alone..." (Mt. 4:4). Making it clear that we should be guided by much higher values in life.

Another important point of today's passage of the Gospel is that in this story of the Apostle Matthew, the image and structure of the Church emerges. Christ is its founder and head, the apostles are appointed spiritual shepherds who spiritually take care of their faithful, and another critical component of this structure is the people of God. It is not by chance that Jesus says in the Gospel, "...you give them something to eat" (Mt. 14:16). He himself takes the bread, blesses it, and hands it to His apostles, and they give it to the people. Literally all this works even until today. At the Holy Last Supper, the Lord commanded, "Do this in remembrance of Me." This is why today we call our Church apostolic, because the faithful receive all the gifts in the church through persons authorized by the Church hierarchy, priests, who receive everything from their Heavenly Lord.

Saint John Chrysostom says, "Seek what is God's, and what is human will follow easily." How many examples do we have from life that the Lord gives first to those who ask for the Kingdom of God, and despite these great gifts, He also gives what we need for our lives. An example comes from the life of the monks of the Kyiv-Pechersk Lavra during the rectorship of Venerable Theodosius of Pechersk. When the brothers serving in the kitchen informed their abbot about the lack of food, Venerable Theodosius, who was constantly engaged in prayer, assured them that the Lord would not leave them without food. And it really happened like that. One good man in a short time brought a lot of products for the monastery.

God's mercy is endless. In order to feed human sons and daughters, the Son of God blesses and breaks simple bread, multiplying it -- this is a great miracle. However, a little time will pass and the Savior, for the sake of all of us, will break His Immaculate Body on the cross, offering Himself as a sacrifice for our sins and yours, giving the Bread of Eternal Life.

Our love and loyalty to God is tested outside the walls of the Temple, where we meet with human grief, with human weaknesses and needs, with human evil and treachery, meanness and betrayal. Here the Lord calls us to act as He Himself acted among people. In our daily affairs, we should draw strength and take an example from Christ Himself, imitating Him in everything.

Dear believers! Each time, approaching the Holy Mysteries of Christ, we pray that the Lord will give us the strength to be good Christians in this world, where Christian values are forgotten by many people, and where the Gospel Commandments are unknown to many people. We ask the Lord to fill our hearts with that grace and that love that will help us carry our life's cross, not forgetting to help our neighbor in carrying his or her heavy cross, so that we act in life as a true Christian should.



#### They All Ate and Were Satisfied

Our Lord in a desert place changed a few loaves into many, and at Cana turned water into wine. Thus before the time came to give men and women His own Body and Blood to feed on, He accustomed their palates to His bread and wine, giving them a taste of transitory bread and wine to teach them to delight in His Life-giving Body and Blood. He gave them things of little value for nothing to make them understand that His supreme gift would be given yet more freely. He gave them for nothing what they could have bought from Him, what in fact they wanted to buy, to teach them that He asked them for no payment. When it was not permitted them to give Him the price of bread and wine, which they could have

done, they certainly could not pay Him for His Body and Blood.

Moreover, as well as giving freely He lovingly coaxed us, offering us these small things without charge to attract us and cause us to go and receive something greater and beyond all price. He awakened our desire by things pleasing to the palate in order to draw us to that which gives life to the soul. He gave a sweet taste to the wine he created to show how great is the treasure hidden in His Life-giving Blood.
