

Ninth Sunday after Pentecost

Dear Brothers and Sisters!

In today's Gospel, we can observe the deity of Jesus Christ as he walks on the water, and the difficulties of life in faith, which are characteristic of his disciples and us. Today's evangelical Gospel testifies that a man walks on water - the Apostle Peter. This becomes possible thanks to the extraordinary presence and power of the word of Jesus Christ, who answers the doubts and fears of the disciples, "Be calm, it is I, do not be afraid!"

After the multiplication of the loaves, Jesus told the disciples to get into the boat and cross to the other side of the sea, while He sent away the people who were satisfied with the bread (Mt 14:22-34). When the boat was in the middle of the sea, a storm arose and the disciples asked each other, "Does Jesus know about our danger?" "Oh, that Jesus was here!" Losing trust in God is the greatest difficulty in times of life's anxieties. In days of distress, when we are burdened with problems and the whole world looks gloomy, we say, "If only Jesus were here!"

But the Lord is always near us, closer than we think. One night, when Jesus was praying on the mountain, He also saw His disciples in the midst of the raging waves. Christ saw the boat being tossed on the sea, He felt all the danger of that storm, He knew very well the danger his friends, the apostles, were in. And, as the Evangelist says, at the fourth watch of the night, Jesus came to them "...walking on the sea..." (Mt 14:26).

And we meet Christ more than once in the midst of the waves of our life, as stormy as on the Sea of Galilee. One of the greatest discoveries in our lives is how shocks, illnesses, and all kinds of difficulties can suddenly lead a person to God. When life is like a stormy sea, full of difficulties and dangers, the Lord is close by, watching over us, and in the midst of this gloom He is personally able to come to us and bring us peace and tranquility.

When the Apostle Peter saw that Christ was walking on the rough sea, he said, "Lord, if it is you, make me come to you by water." And Christ immediately answered, "Come." Jesus says the same thing to us today, "Come, You can walk on the turbulent waves of your life." If you are struck by an illness, you can say, "God, lead me to walk through the waves of this illness to You." If a financial crisis has destroyed your life, you can say, "God, guide me through the waves of this calamity." If you are having problems in your married life, you can say, "God, guide me through the turbulent waves of my marriage." This same power, this same faith, the same Christ that helped Peter walk through the stormy waves of the Sea of Galilee, is with us today. It is Jesus who gives us the strength to endure the storms of our lives and pass by the turbulent waves.

Christ answered the cry of the Apostle Peter for help in danger. When Jesus looked at the sea and saw His disciples in danger, He immediately went to them. When He saw Peter drowning, He immediately stretched out His hand to save him. This is the most important message of today's Gospel. When our life becomes like a stormy sea, full of difficulties and challenges, the Lord is next to us, and out of this global darkness, He is the one who is able to help us, to bring us peace and tranquility in our lives.

Thomas Wright, in one of his popular commentaries, said this about this passage of the Gospel, "The apostles who were sitting in the boat saw many manifestations of the power of Jesus, listened to His sermons, and prayed as He taught. Now these skillful fishermen had a hard time, they struggled with their oars, but could hardly make headway against the wind. And we today, although we have invented, learned, and discovered a lot, we still do not have enough strength, power, and knowledge to achieve all that is necessary for us. We have invented a lot of military equipment, but so far, we have not invented such machines that could establish peace on earth. We are ready to send a man to the moon, but we cannot feed the hungry on planet Earth. Our devices allow us to listen to the sounds that whales make in the depths of the ocean, but we are not able to hear the cry of a person who lives on the next street."

Dear believers! Today's Gospel shows that Jesus can calm any hurricane in our life, just as He can dispel the darkness of any night. It can fill our life with true meaning, throw out of it what is actually worthless, and fleeting. So, like the Apostle Peter, let's say today, "Save me, Lord, because I'm drowning!"

Trust in Prayer

A man sat in his luxurious hotel room and dialed room service. He marveled at the fact that at the other end of the telephone line was an individual waiting to respond to his every need All he had to do was ask

Many people believe that prayer is supposed to work the same way. For them, God is at the receiving end of their prayers and is expected to grant every prayer requested. "And why shouldn't it be?" they might ask. "Doesn't God want me to get this new job?" "Doesn't God want my marriage to work?" "Doesn't God want my surgery to be successful?" After all, don't we read in the Scriptures, "Ask and you shall receive?"

The answer is, yes - God always wants what is best for us, and every prayer is answered. But, not every prayer is answered as we expect it to be. In order to be able to accept God's answers to our prayers, especially the unanticipated answers, we need to exercise patience, trust and openness to God's will and His wisdom.

We see Saint Peter exercise this kind of trust in God in today's Gospel lesson. While the disciples' boat was being storm-tossed on the sea, Jesus came walking on water toward them. Then, Jesus issued a most unexpected command to Peter. "Come," Jesus said and Peter actually began walking on water toward Him! It was only when Peter took his eyes away from Jesus and focused again on the perilous storm around him that he began to sink. The same is true for us. When we trust God, He will lead us to safety. When we take our eyes away from Him, we become overwhelmed by the storms of life.
