



13th Sunday after Pentecost

Dear Brothers and Sisters!

Today, we heard the parable of the wicked vinedressers told by Jesus Christ to His disciples. Very often the Lord spoke to His disciples, and ordinary listeners in parables, to make it easier for them to know the profound truths and mysteries of the Kingdom of God in the images of their ordinary lives.

The Lord spoke this parable after the Pharisees asked by what authority He performed all miracles. Each word of the parable has a special meaning. The Great Vineyard protected the vineyard's life from death with reliable protection - the Law of God and the commandments, so that no one could steal a man from God. He erected a watchtower - conscience - not a corrupt and indefatigable guardian of purity and truth of soul. But man, by his fall, violates this wonderful harmony of God.

Saint Theophanes, the Hermit, wrote, "The wisdom of the Christian life lies in practical action." Every one of our deeds, whether great or small, must be remembered to do so before the eyes of God.

Another of the modern elders draws our attention to the cornerstone. We know from the Scriptures that the cornerstone is God. Therefore, if we take Him from the foundation, the whole structure will fall. The Lord has given man power. He gives him the ability to manage, cultivate, grow a variety of fruits, and enjoy life. Let's look around and into the vineyard of our soul, because each of us received it at birth. Let's look at our fruits. Is God in our vineyard?

Most of you have probably heard of St. Ignatius the Godbearer. He was a holy man of the early apostolic Church. The holy tradition says that lonatius the Godbearer was brought to Christ the Sayior by his very young parents, and it was the Lord who took him in his arms and said, "...Let the children come to me, do not hinder them; for to such belongs the kingdom of God (Mark 10:14). The Savior held him in His arms, which is why Ignatius was called the Godbearer. When this saint was executed (he was attacked by wild beasts), he kept repeating the name of Christ. He explained to the astonished mocking watchman, I have the name of Jesus Christ written in my heart, because I confess with my mouth the One whom I always carry in my heart. He was torn to pieces by the beasts, but by God's providence his heart remained intact among the remains. Then, out of curiosity, his tormentors cut his heart in half and to his surprise saw there was an inscription in gold letters, "Jesus Christ". This episode in life, from the life of Ignatius the Godbearer, most clearly shows us that we must be Godbearers, we are able to build the Kingdom of God in ourselves.

One believing salesman was asked, "Why do you try to weigh and measure everything you sell so accurately?" "Because," he replied, "God has given me only one life, and I must go forward all the time, and I must never go back to correct my mistakes and shortcomings." If all people valued time and performed their duties so much, then much good would be done in the world, and fewer mistakes and fruitless deeds would be done.

So, dear believers! There is no person who does not have a conscience. However, not everyone listens to it. Another voice of God is the Holy Scriptures, which indicate what we should do and what we should renounce. Prayer, humility, and repentance are the means God gives us so that we can bear spiritual fruit, so that we may inherit the Kingdom that the Lord has prepared for those who love Him.

REFLECTION FROM MOUNT ST. MACRINA: "Blessed are the poor in spirit." Sister Barbara Jean Mihalchick posts videos of her reflections each week on the Facebook page of the Sisters of St. Basil the Great. They may be viewed at: https://www.facebook.com/sistersofstbasil.uniontown/. This is a transcript of her July 10, 2020, reflection, Glory to Jesus Christ! Today we begin a long series on the Beatitudes that Jesus offered us in the Gospel of Matthew. With this teaching, He begins the Sermon on the Mount, a whole long discourse about many aspects of life and God, and the Light of God, describing also what God is like. The whole sermon is a lifetime's challenge. But the Beatitudes is an encapsulation. It gives us "flashes of lightning" in looking at the life of Jesus Himself; life in the Kingdom of God. These "flashes" show us the "interior." If Jesus could say, "This is what God is like on the inside. This is what Jesus is like in His depths." That's what He is explaining to us in the Beatitudes. And still holding them out as something we should reach to live buy His Grace!

The very first one is: "Blessed are the poor in spirit." Here, He is talking about openness before God; He is talking about humility. Here Jesus talks about a "spirit" which is not very much like the American spirit or the spirit of our times because in order to get ahead we've been taught how much we need to reach out and be in charge. People who want to get ahead study leadership, buy those books and try to put those aspects into power in their lives. But Jesus is saying "trust God." Jesus is saying "come to Me, ask for what you need, trust that God is with you." And that God doesn't need to be managed by us, which is so often our tendency, isn't it? We would like God to see things our way, do things our way. But I think of Jesus at the Last Supper dialogue; I compare it to this. He's about to leave His disciples with the huge challenge of taking His message to all the world. And He says, "Wait for the Holy Spirit. Wait for the help that will be given you and place your trust in Me."

Today, we live in that Church, in that Kingdom, in that grace that has spread to all the world and has come to fill our lives with Him in ever-flowing love and grace. May we be poor in spirit and place our trust in our Loving God. God bless you.

The Vineyard is the Kingdom

The kingdom of God upon earth is here compared to a vineyard, furnished with all things requisite to an advantageous management and improvement of it. He planted this vineyard. The church is the planting of the Lord, Isaiah 61:3. The forming of a church is a work by itself, like the planting of a vineyard, which requires a great deal of cost and care. It is the vineyard which his right hand has planted (Psalms 80:15), planted with the choicest vine (Isaiah 5:2), a noble vine, Jeremiah 2:21. The earth of itself produces thorns and briars; but vines must be planted. The being of a church is owing to God's distinguishing favour, and his manifesting himself to some, and not to others

He hedged it round about. Note, God's church in the world is taken under his special protection. It is a hedge round about, like that about Job on every side (Job 1:10), a wall of fire,

Zechariah 2:5. Wherever God has a church, it is. and will always be, his peculiar care. The covenant of circumcision and the ceremonial law were a hedge or a wall of partition about the Jewish church, which is taken down by Christ; who yet has appointed a gospel order and discipline to be the hedge of his church. He will not have his vineyard to lie in common, that those who are without, may thrust in at pleasure; not to lie at large, that those who are within, may lash out at pleasure; but care is taken to set bounds about this holy mountain.

He dug a wine-press and built a tower. The altar of burnt-offerings was the wine-press, to which all the offerings were brought. God instituted ordinances in his church, for the due oversight of it, and for the promoting of its fruitfulness. What could have been done more to make it every way convenient?
