

15th Sunday after Pentecost

Dear Brothers and Sisters!

Today's Gospel reveals to us the main commandment of Christ: "...You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all thy strength, and with all thy mind, and your neighbor as yourself" (Luke 10:27). "On these two commandments depend all the law and the prophets" (Matthew 22:40).

The Reverend Abba Dorotheus, who lived in the 6th century, said: "If mankind is placed in different places in a circle, then God must be placed in the center of that circle. As we approach the center, we approach God, the love of God. But not only, walking towards the center, we get closer to God, become saints, receive holiness. We are also getting closer to the center as we get closer to each other." In the same way, when we all go to church, we become closer to each other. When we all part and walk away from the Church and from God, we move away from each other.

Jesus Christ shows us how we should live - to live in love of God and love of neighbor. The evangelist Luke complements this conversation of Jesus Christ with the Pharisee with the words, "Do this, and you will live," because the very theoretical knowledge of the law of love for God and neighbor will not save us if we do not live by this commandment.

During Sunday school, the priest tried to explain to the children that money is not the most important thing in life. "Money cannot buy happiness, joy, or love. Tell me, children, how could I offer you a hundred dollars, provided you don't love your dad and mom, would you agree?"

The class was silent, but little Gianni reached out and shouted, "Father, make some clever suggestions... Let's discuss how much you will give for my older sister?"

The evangelist John says, "If anyone says, 'I love God,' and hates his brother, he is a liar," and Blessed Augustine teaches that although love of God is more important than love of neighbor, one must begin with love of neighbor, for "he who does not love his brother, whom he sees, cannot love God, whom he does not see."

One day, a tourist asked a nun who was washing the wounds of a leper. "How much do you earn by caring for these patients? I wouldn't do that even for a million a day!" The nun answered him, "and I would not do it for a million!" The tourist asked again, "Then who forces you to do it?" "The one upstairs," the nun replied, pointing to the sky.

John Paul II says, "You will not find love without the cross, and you will not bear the cross without love. Therefore, I wish you to love those around you and be open to love. It is love that helps us to be united with our daily cross, not to complain, not to pass on to others, but to take and follow Christ." People often want to receive love, but not everyone is ready to give love to others.

A boy named Gregory liked to run after sparrows in the yard and threw small stones at them, and with each wave of his hand, they flew from the ground to the fence, and then from the fence to the roof. It was a great pleasure for him. Suddenly, a poor girl next door, dressed in an old dress, approached the courtyard gate. Her legs were bare and she had a small basket in her hand. "Are you a beggar? Do you need bread," said Gregory reaching out his hand to her. The girl trustingly, held out her little hand to him. "Come on, take it!" Gregory laughed, and put a stone in her hand. The girl, said nothing, just looked at the gray stone, then through tears looked at Gregory, bowed her head, and walked quietly away on the dusty road.

For a moment, Gregory was in pain and felt sorry for her, he just wanted to joke around, but the joke was cruel. Gregory ran to the kitchen, cut off a large piece of bread, and ran out by the road to look for the girl. Then he ran into the field, looked here and there, but the girl was nowhere to be seen. He was ready to give her everything he had, but the girl disappeared without a trace, taking with him his gray stone.

God often gives us opportunities to grow in love, but do we always know how to recognize and use them properly? Dear believers! Only in love is God known. Love is the greatest and most important fruit of the spiritual life, as the Apostle Paul teaches, "So faith, hope, love abide, these three; but the greatest of these is love" (1 Cor. 13:13). In eternity, the need for faith and hope will disappear, and only love will remain. Therefore, let us take special care of this greatest gift - the gift of love, because as is our love for God on earth, so will be the joy of eternity.


