



METROPOLITAN ASSEMBLY: Most Rev. William Skurla, Metropolitan Archbishop of Pittsburgh, has invited all clergy and faithful to the Assembly of the Byzantine (Ruthenian) Metropolitan Church at St. Mary's Byzantine Catholic Church, 1900 Brooks Boulevard, Hillsboro, NJ, 08844, **November 2-5, 2023**. The theme of this Assembly is *"Living Our Faith, Moving Forward, Appreciating Our Past."* **What does the Byzantine Catholic Church mean to you? Next year marks the 100th anniversary of the arrival of Basil Takach, the first Bishop of the Byzantine Ruthenian Catholic Church in America. Registration is now open.** The Assembly cost is \$250 for individuals and \$400 for couples. The fee includes meals, breaks, presentations, materials, and the gala on Saturday evening. The Maria Theresa Foundation will underwrite the registration fees of individuals and couples between the ages of 18 and 35. Special rates for hotel accommodations have been arranged at the Hilton Garden Inn, 500 Promenade Boulevard, Bridgewater, NJ, 08807, and is a 15-minute drive to St. Mary's Church. 

Honoring God's Name

The Second Commandment: "Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in Vain"

Glory to Jesus Christ!

We continue with the Commandments. Last month, the first one, "I am the Lord your God, you shall have no strange gods before me."

The second one, "You shall not take the name of the Lord your God in vain."

Just to give some context about names, all of us have heard about or witnessed fights among kids when someone has mocked his or her father or mother.

Why? Because we're sensitive to disrespect for those we love. Names are meaningful. They hold powerful emotions for us and they refer to persons, persons who are worthy of respect.

God's names – because we use many names for God; first of all, there is the Trinity: God the Father, God the Son, God the Holy Spirit – but we also call God Lord and many other precious names.

Their names should convey to us that sense of the sacred reflected in that First Commandment. And in the name is even God's presence. Therefore, we should use God's name only to bless, to praise, to glorify God and by the way, this includes also the names of the Mother of God and of the saints; all deserving high respect. Besides prayer, though, we do use God's name in other honorable ways. We make promises sometimes in God's name, in good faith. We take oaths in God's name. We have all witnessed someone swearing on a Bible and saying, "I swear to do this," and ending that with "So help me God." That's mighty serious.

But if a person swears a false oath – they're using God's name for wrong or he doesn't intend to keep this oath – or he makes an oath to do wrong, these are sins against the Second Commandment; taking God's name in vain. Along with that is perjury, blasphemy; using God's name in a magical way or any mocking way. These are sins against the Second Commandment, as well.

Along with this, let us consider our own names because they too are precious and need to be respected. Recognizing the dignity of every person is important. And the way we pronounce or use another person's name. Along with the name we respect their reputation, their personhood, their essence. For most of us, this name has been received in Holy Baptism. God recognizes this name for all eternity! He calls us each this name.

We begin our prayers in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. There is power in God's name. In the Eastern Christian tradition, we love and use the Jesus prayer, recognizing the power in the name of our Holy Savior.

So, I invite you to reflect on this – where does honoring God's name fit in your life?

May we all grow in praise and gratitude!

Whatever Their Size, Carry Them

“Whoever loses his life for my sake and the Gospel’s will save it.” One who knew the meaning of Jesus’ words so well was Flannery O’Connor, the distinguished Catholic novelist who died in 1964 at the age of 39. From the age of 25 she lived with the knowledge she had a terminal disease, Lupus, – not to mention her sufferings from bone disintegration, shingles, anemia, and a tumor. Yet it was during fourteen years of sickness and suffering that she produced her greatest works of literary art. Her strong faith enabled her to say: “I have never been anywhere but sick. In a sense sickness is a place, more instructive than a long trip to Europe. Sickness before death is a very appropriate thing and I think those who don’t have it miss one of God’s mercies ...”

Those are strong words! How could a young woman call sickness one of God’s mercies? Yet Jesus’ words in the Gospel are just as strong: “If a man wishes to come after me, he must deny his very self, take up his

cross, and follow in my steps.”

In some way Flannery O’Connor was able to accept the cross of her sickness and follow in the Lord’s footsteps. But she didn’t do it with a nice sweet smile on her face. She did it with strong courage and conviction. She realized that her own sickness was the very thing that helped her to look at life around her with the eyes of faith; and to translate that life into literary pages that would win her international fame as a writer. Each one of us is called upon to carry a cross in our life at some time. For some it may be the cross of emotional or spiritual suffering, rather than physical suffering. Sometimes there are big crosses, sometimes small. Whatever their size, Jesus calls upon us to carry them.
