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heard other harsh words – but she heard them, and at the same time she saw the face of Divine Love, addressing her.

And the Savior here, as in other cases, responds to faith with love and His power to heal, and mercifully save. "Woman! Your faith is great! Let it be according to your will." And at that hour her daughter recovered. Here we also see once again that there is no limit to God's compassion. He does not divide people into believers and non-believers, His own and strangers: for Him there are no strangers – all are His. But at the same time, He expects and demands from us not frivolous faith, but true faith. This we must learn from the Canaanite.

One man was very fond of frequenting cafes and getting drunk with his friends. Every time after a good drink, his conscience woke up and he repented, saying, "Forgive me, Lord." It happened time and time again. Satan looked and looked at all this, but then he could not stand it and asked God, "This man sins and repents, and then he sins again and You accept him every time after repentance." God answered, "If you, Satan, are ready to accept him after every sin, then I am all the more ready to accept him after repentance, because My mercy is much greater."

In ancient times, a master who made swords tempered them, and then beat them with full swing against a stone, testing their strength and fitness for battle. Thus, the Lord tested the great strength of faith of the Canaanite woman. The Holy Fathers say that here the daughter's body is our body, which is inflamed by passions. And when our passions rise so strongly against the soul, then we also become like the possessed.

John Listvychnyk teaches that in the virtue of humility, pride sinks with all its attachments, like a ship in the sea. A demon is a proud spirit that fears submission more than anything. And that is why humility is a great help in the spiritual struggle. Humility is the truth about yourself and about God. We have nothing of ourselves – everything we have comes from God: "Whatever you have, you have received" (1 Cor. 4:7). Anthony the Great claims that faith drives out demons, and obedience drives out devilish princes. Ephram the Syrian saw the various spiritual weapons of the saints in the fight against demons, but he is ready to choose humility. Humility alone saves a sinner, and without this virtue all virtues are small.

Dear believers! The example of the Canaanite woman reminds us of this important truth that Jesus helps us by the power of our faith. The more true and strong our faith is, the more Christ manifests his omnipotence, cleanses life from evil and fills each of us with good – truth and love.

# Thirty-second Sunday After Pentecost Homily

Dear brothers and sisters!

Today we listened to the Gospel story about the Canaanite woman, who was probably the only one of all who turned to Christ that was initially rejected by Him. She asked the Lord to heal her daughter, but Christ continued to walk on without even returning. But she ran after Him with shouts, begging Him to respond. He was silent. He was silent until the disciples said to Him, "Teacher, let her go, because she is crying out after us." Then the Lord returned to this pagan woman and said such words that we do not find anywhere else in the Gospel. He told her that she was a pagan, worshiping idols, and therefore could not receive the grace of healing. However, this woman did not take offense, did not turn back, but continued to ask. And when the Lord told her strictly that He gives bread to children, that He cannot give bread to dogs, she objected, "Lord, even dogs eat crumbs that fall from the children's table." Then the Lord stopped and answered, "Woman, your faith is great. Go, your daughter will be healthy." Why did the Lord test her so? Of course, we cannot answer for Him. The secret of Christ's thoughts is hidden from us. We only know that He never refused anyone, not even pagans. There was a centurion in Capernaum, a Roman — He did not refuse him. On the contrary, He immediately praised this man, saying that even in Israel He did not find such faith, and then healed his servant.

Christ says, "I am not sent to everyone – I am sent to the lost sheep of the house of Israel...." The Canaanite answers, "Lord! Help..." She does not respond to His remark that He is not sent to her; she simply believes that He will pity her; she does not argue; she does not claim, "How so – I am also a person!" No, she just believes. Jesus tests her faith once more. Of course, he knew this belief, and the Canaanite knew His insight. But the disciples probably had to measure the depth of faith of which the heathen was capable. He tells her, "It is not good to take bread from the children and give it to the dogs...." These words seem so cruel and merciless that you can understand them if you imagine the Savior who lowered his gaze – an attentive, thoughtful, compassionate gaze – to the raised eyes of this women. She heard these words – as she had
