My parish is composed of people like me. I help make it what it is. It will be friendly, if I am. It will be holy, if I am. Its pews will be filled, if I help fill them. It will do great work, if I work. It will be prayerful, if I pray. It will make generous gifts to many causes, if I am a generous giver. It will bring others into worship, if I invite and bring them in. It will be a place of loyalty and love, of fearlessness and faith, of compassion, charity, and mercy, if I, who make it what it is, am filled with these same things. Therefore, with the help of God, I now dedicate myself to the task of being all the things that I want my parish to be.

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Schedule of Divine Services:

Note that the mother does not say: "Have mercy on my child," but: "Have mercy on me." In other words, the affliction of the daughter is the affliction of the mother. The daughter is any soul in the Church. The mother, who is the Church, is a solicitous mother: she intercedes for the weaknesses of all the children of the Church. She intercedes for our weaknesses. As you see, we are revealed here a mystery about the prayer of intercession. We pray for each other. We are asked at times to pray for various people and for specific demands, as long as they correspond to the will of God. Look at the story of the Canaanite woman. Christ does not look for faith from the daughter; in the same way, he does not look for faith from the daughter of the centurion (Mat 9:18-26) nor for faith from the daughter of the servant (Mat 8:6-13). He looks only for the faith of the one who intercedes. Christ answers when He is satisfied with the faith of those who approach Him on the behalf of those who needs healing. You will find confirmation of this in the text which follows immediately the Canaanite woman. The crowds bring the sick people to Christ for healing. This is the faith of the crowds which is offered to Christ so that the blind may study the Word, the dumb may praise with their voices and the paralyzed may follow Christ. Dear believers, all starts with us faith. If we make that free-choice and if it is founded in humility, then us faith will be us shield and us weapon leading us to victory. 35th Sunday after Pentecost

Dear brother and sisters!

The Gospel of today is the story of a miracle. Like all miracle stories, it is there to remind us that Christ is not only the Judge but also the Physician of our souls and bodies. It is there also to increase our faith, both by giving us warranties of the Glory to come and by helping us to trust in God.

Often the Jews would refer to the Gentiles as "dogs," as a term of disrespect, an insult. But there's something in the way that Jesus says it. In the Greek language, there are a couple of ways to say "dog." The word that Jews would use to insult Gentiles is not the one that Jesus uses. Instead, he uses a form of the word that can be translated as "little pet dogs," "doggies." It's an affectionate term, used for dogs who got to live in the house and were taken care of. Jesus here is giving the woman an opening to grab on to. And the Canaanite woman picks up on it. "Yes, Lord," she says, "yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table."

The great faith of the Canaanite woman, produced by the Spirit working through the word. It is a faith that perseveres and takes the Lord up on his promises. God wants to give us that same kind of faith-persevering faith in a merciful Lord. God wants us to come to Jesus, time and time again, in spite of any obstacles us may face. People do it all the time. When there is suffering in their life, they give up and think that God is uncaring. But God does not want you to give up. He wants us to persevere, in faith, like the Canaanite woman. He wants us to seek-and to find-his mercy and blessing.
