Byzantine Catholic Eparchy of Passaic Fasting Regulations for the Great Fast 2022

Abstinence:

- The law of Abstinence forbids the use of meat, permitting the use of eggs and dairy products.
- All the faithful of the Eparchy who receive Holy Communion are obliged to abstain.
- Abstinence is to be observed on all Wednesdays and Fridays during the Holy Season of the Great Fast.

Strict Abstinence:

- The law of Strict Abstinence (Fast) forbids the use of meat, eggs, and dairy products.
- All the adult faithful of the Eparchy who receive Holy Communion are obliged to observe Strict Abstinence.
- Strict Abstinence is to be observed on the First Day of the Great Fast, Pure Monday, February 28 and on Great and Holy Friday, April 15.

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It is no coincidence that Christ pointed out that this unfortunate man had become a swineherd, for grazing pigs was the most humiliating occupation for a true Jew, for the law of Moses despised pigs as unclean animals. In this way, the Savior shows the extremely difficult condition of this man, because no one even gave him corn cobs to feed pigs. And this prodigal son came to his senses, realized his deplorable condition, and seemed to wake up from a sinful sleep and his conscience awoke. When he woke up, he saw and understood the gravity of his condition, and began to look for a way out of it. He thought, "I will get up, go to my father and say to him, 'Father! I have sinned before heaven and before you, and am no longer worthy to be called your son; accept me as one of your hirelings' "(Luke 15: 18-19). In these words we see an expression of deep humility and a sense of our unworthiness, which is always accompanied by a sincere repentance of the sinner and an expression of deep love for the father's house and consent to be accepted into parental homes, even in the most difficult conditions. St. John Chrysostom says, "God never rejects sincere repentance, but even if one reaches extreme depravity and then decides to return to the path of virtue, he accepts it and brings it closer to Himself and does everything to bring him to the former and even better condition."

Saint Ephraim the Syrian, the teacher of repentance, says: "Repentance is a holiday for God, because Heaven also calls us to rejoice. Angels rejoice when repentance invites them to dinner." The famous Hollywood actor Robert De Niro once said brilliantly "There is nothing better than going back to where nothing has changed, to understand how much you have changed." This view, albeit not to the end of the Christian, illustrates very well the meaning of today's Gospel. Dear believers! Today's parable, of course, is not over. We would like to know what happened next, how the younger brother will behave, whether the older and younger brothers will reconcile, whether the older son will return home to share the joy with his father, or whether he remains uncompromising and angry. However, the Lord leaves us in a certain ignorance so that we can consider the continuation of this story and our place in it. There is no end to the parable, because each of us adds to it with his or her own life.

Memory of the Faithful Departed: As Catholics we are baptized into the death of Christ so that we might share in His Resurrection (Rom 6:3-4), therefore it is appropriate to remember the faithful departed in the time surrounding the celebration of His Death and Resurrection. The Church sets aside five Saturdays, one before the Fast, three during the Fast, and one before Pentecost, for us to pray in a special way for the departed.

It is important for all of us to pray for the remission of the sins and the mercy of God for the departed since, one day, we will join them and be in need of the prayers of the living as well. Please make an effort to attend one All Souls Saturday this year.

The first All Souls Saturday is this Saturday, February 19. Divine Liturgy followed by *Panachida* will be celebrated at Patronage Church at 4 PM. Vespers followed by *Panachida* will be celebrated at St. Gregory Church at 6 PM.

Synod on Synodality: In October of 2021, Pope Francis announced a two-year process of listening and dialogue in the Catholic Church. Sunday of the Prodigal Son Homily

Dear brothers and sisters!

Today's Sunday "about the prodigal son" brings us closer again and prepares us for Lent. Holy Mother Church calls everyone to repentance, reminding us that in the case of true humility and repentance, the Lord, as a loving Father, opens to us the embrace of His mercy and forgives the gravest sins.

The parable of the prodigal son or good Father, as it is sometimes called, is a lesson in repentance. It is a story of repentance preceded by decline, repentance preceded by sin. This is a story about a son who, due to his own carelessness, leaves the house of love, the Father's house. It is a touching description of parental love, hope and expectation, which cannot be logically explained, but simply makes you think – think about God and think about yourself.

However, it should be noted that at the very beginning of the story the son demands from his father his share of the estate, which, of course, should greatly offend the father. But something completely different is happening. There is no description of the offended father, but there is a simple statement of fact: "And the father divided the property between them" (Luke 15:12). Each of the sons received his share of the estate, to which they had little to contribute. What does this indicate? Nothing but the love and trust of the Father. Running away from home does not bring happiness, but only sadness and hunger. The property all went to waste, the departing son's friends disappeared, he himself was forced to

The Holy Fathers teach us that every sinner, when attached to some object through which he satisfies his sinful passion, often brings himself to the most humiliating state. He begins to "feed the pigs," that is, as if a slave serves the passions and lusts that are inspired by the spirits of the wickedness and captivate the soul.
