Byzantine Catholic Eparchy of Passaic Fasting Regulations for the Great Fast 2023

Abstinence:

- The law of Abstinence forbids the use of meat, permitting the use of eggs and dairy products.

- All the faithful of the Eparchy who receive Holy Communion are obliged to abstain.

- Abstinence is to be observed on all Wednesdays and Fridays during the Holy Season of the Great Fast.

Strict Abstinence:

- The law of Strict Abstinence (Fast) forbids the use of meat, eggs, and dairy products.

- All the adult faithful of the Eparchy who receive Holy Communion are obliged to observe Strict Abstinence.

- Strict Abstinence is to be observed on the First Day of the Great Fast, Pure Monday, February 20 and on Great and Holy Friday, April 7.

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Jesus' dialogue with Nathaniel and Nathaniel's profession of faith we read that Jesus answered him, "You shall see greater things than these. Truly, truly, I say to you, you will see heaven opened, and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of man." This reference is to the vision that was received by Jacob in the Book of Genesis. In this part of the story of the Patriarchs, Jacob, the grandson of Abraham, was trying to escape the wrath of his brother, Esau, from whom he had swindled the blessing of their father, Isaac some time after Esau gave him this. Jacob was fleeing for his life to see his uncle Laban in Haran, when he stopped late at Mount Moriah, pitched his tent, and went to sleep. While he was sleeping, a vision came to him in his dream of a ladder going from the top of Mount Moriah to the heavens, and on this stairway or ladder there were hosts of the angelic powers moving up and down. Jacob was absolutely awestruck by this.

He also saw a vision of the Lord either above or beside the stairway, and God said to him: "I am the Lord, the God of Abraham your father and the God of Isaac; the land on which you lie I will give to you and to your descendants... Behold, I am with you and will keep you wherever you go, and will bring you back to this land." Then Jacob awoke from his sleep and said, "Surely the Lord is in this place; and I did not know it." And he was afraid. When he awoke, Jacob took the stone that he had used as a pillow, anointed it with oil, saving "the Lord shall be my God, and this stone, which I have set up for a pillar, shall be God's house." Why is this vision important and what does it have to do with the Gospel reading today? This vision at Bethel, which is what Jacob named that spot meaning "the house of God" is the vision of a new temple which will be built on Mount. There the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob gave a vision to Jacob about a new temple that would be established which would bring heaven and earth together, with angelic powers ascending and descending on the mountain of God. This new Temple would at first be Solomon's temple, but later on it would be Jesus Christ Himself who in His human and divine natures would bring heaven and earth. With Jesus the Royal High Priest who ascended into glory, earthly worship ascends to the heavens, and heavenly worship condescends to dwell in our midst.

Third and finally, we have the Cherubic Hymn that we sing at the Great Entrance. This Cherubic Hymn is what we sing speaking of our representative and mystical participation with the cherubim and seraphim in the heavenly worship of God. We are now like those angels ascending and descending on Jacob's Ladder – the Incarnate Son of God who unites heaven and earth.

My brothers and sisters in Christ, in the Divine Liturgy, we have been brought to the Mountain of God, to His Holy Hill...we have stood before the Gates of Heaven. During this time of the Great Fast, may we strive to ascend worthily up this holy mountain, with clean hands and a pure heart. The King of Glory, the Mountain of God, the Lord of Hosts, the God of Jacob at Bethel is now going to be present with us in Jesus Christ, under the appearances of the Holy Gifts of Bread and Wine. May we be one with the angels and saints present with us in the holy icons in giving Him the glory that He is due!

Homily for Sunday of Orthodoxy

Today is the First Sunday of the Great fast which is traditionally referred to as the Sunday of Orthodoxy. This is the Sunday where we commemorate the restoration of the Holy Icons in the Byzantine churches after a 117-year period of iconoclasm, where images that were hidden away were processed in the streets and restored to the churches. This restoration was a clear profession of faith in Jesus Christ and the new plan of salvation whereby it was clearly affirmed that orthodox faith and worship included the veneration of the images of Christ, the Theotokos, the angels and the saints. In our churches, then, the realms of heaven and earth are brought together, united in Christ who sits at the right hand of the Father. Three points in our liturgy today should remind us that that the Church is an earthly icon of the heavenly realms. First, at the beginning of the liturgy, the priest or the deacon performed the Great Incensation around the whole church. The altar area of the sanctuary, the whole iconostasis and all of the icons around the nave and then the faithful were all incensed. This act of incensing is meant to point to three things: First, it signifies the holy fragrance of a floral Paradise renewed – a New Eden. Second, it signifies the holy prayers and petitions of the Church being entrusted to God through Christ, and all the saints and angels. Third, it signifies the visual sense of clouds at a high elevation – the peak of the Mountain of the Lord. Here the spiritual heights of the church and the clouds of incense give us a sense of the holiness of God and Christ enthroned in the glorious heavens.

Second, we have the reading of today's Gospel from Saint John the Theologian. At the end of
