Byzantine Catholic Eparchy of Passaic Fasting Regulations for the Great Fast 2022

Abstinence:

- The law of Abstinence forbids the use of meat, permitting the use of eggs and dairy products.
- All the faithful of the Eparchy who receive Holy Communion are obliged to abstain.
- Abstinence is to be observed on all Wednesdays and Fridays during the Holy Season of the Great Fast.

Strict Abstinence:

- The law of Strict Abstinence (Fast) forbids the use of meat, eggs, and dairy products.
- All the adult faithful of the Eparchy who receive Holy Communion are obliged to observe Strict Abstinence.
- Strict Abstinence is to be observed on the First Day of the Great Fast, Pure Monday, February 28 and on Great and Holy Friday, April 15.

Looking at the holy cross, we see Jesus, not only crucified, nailed to a tree, but Jesus, who out of love for us sacrificed His life to give us eternal life. The Savior's outstretched arms on the cross are an invitation to all people to come to Him, to trust in His fatherly arms.

The Holy Fathers teach that God gives us the cross, and the cross reveals God to us, gives us the knowledge of His life. It is through the Lord's cross that a new knowledge of good and evil is revealed to us. As Adam in paradise wished to become God, he wished to build his life without the Creator, Who gave him this life, and because of this prohibition Adam was put to death and this death spread to all mankind. Thus, the Scriptures continue to encourage us: "Through the transgression of one many have died... through the grace of one man, Jesus Christ, the grace of God has been generously poured out on many." Because of one man's disobedience, many people have become sinners, so because of one man's obedience, many people will become righteous" (Romans 5: 15-19).

Gregory the Theologian teaches that all that happened on the cross, all this was the redemption of what happened in paradise as a result of the Fall. The cross tree becomes a symbol of paradise; hands outstretched on the cross - hands that stretched to the tree of knowledge of good and evil; the crown of thorns - becomes a symbol of evil rule; tasting of bile and vinegar symbolizes illegal tasting of the forbidden fruit...

The Holy Fathers teach us: "Look at the three crosses: the cross of the Savior, the cross of the prudent thief who cried out to Christ: "Jesus! Remember me when you come into your kingdom" (Luke 23: 41-42); and the cross of a foolish robber, for whom the cross did not become a sign of salvation because he mocked God. And the whole human race carries crosses in life. However, for some who trust in God's help, they represent salvation, and for others, who constantly complain about their lives, they do not become salvation at all. Dear believers! Following the example of the good thief who was crucified next to Christ, let us

repeat his words to Jesus: "Remember me, Lord, when you come into your kingdom!"

The Feast of the Annunciation: Without the Word of God taking flesh in the womb of the Mother of God, we humans could never enter into Heaven. That is why the icon of the Annunciation is always present on the Royal Doors of the Icon Screen, and why the Feast of the Annunciation is always celebrated with great solemnity, even if it falls on Great and Holy Friday, as it did in 2016, or on Pascha, as it will in 2035.

The Annunciation is also closely tied to the death of Jesus, since, according to an ancient tradition, men of great significance die on the anniversary of their conception. According to the Gospel of John, Jesus was crucified at the same time the lambs for the Passover meal were being slayed. That would be 10 *nisan* on the Hebrew calendar. It was later determined that in the year Jesus died, 10 *nisan* would have corresponded to March 25 on the Roman calendar. Therefore, that day was chosen to mark the Annunciation as well.

Special Collection for Ukraine: Metropolitan William has authorized a special collection for the relief of the victims of the war in Ukraine be taken up throughout the Metropolia. Starting today and for the next two Sundays, parishioners are encouraged to remember our brothers and sisters in need. Checks should be made out to your respective parish with the memo "For Ukraine." A single check from each parish will then be forwarded to the Eparchy after the collection.

Synod on Synodality: In October of 2021, Pope Francis announced a two-year process of listening and dialogue in the Catholic Church. His wish is that the voices of *all* the faithful be heard during this time. We will be holding in each church over the next two weeks.

3rd Sunday of Lent Homily

Dear brothers and sisters!

On the third Sunday of Lent, our Church honors the Holy Cross of the Lord. Together with the cross, we honor Jesus Christ himself, who sanctified this sign with his sufferings and made it a powerful means of sanctification and salvation for Christians. Contemplating the cross of the Lord, it appears before us first of all as an extraordinary source of God's sacrificial love, which saved people from the bondage of sin and eternal damnation, as a source of spiritual strength. Coming to church today, we see the Cross of the Lord placed in the middle of the temple, and on it the Crucifixion of our Lord Jesus Christ. At Golgotha, our Lord and God Jesus Christ suffered, taking upon Himself the sins of the whole world. All the earthly life of our Lord was a continuous feat of love, but on Golgotha it shone with such a strange, divine light, before which even the sun shone. He is nailed to the cross innocently, and He begs His Heavenly Father at this time, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing."

Before His crucifixion, Jesus Christ told his disciples, "There is no greater love than to lay down one's life for one's friends."

This Sunday we sing: "We bow to Your Cross, Lord..." With this song we honor the sufferings that Jesus endured for our sanctification and salvation.
