The Prophet Elijah and the Blessing of Cars: In the second chapter of the *Second Book of Kings* in the Old Testament we read how the prophet Elijah was taken up into heaven in a fiery chariot in front of his disciple, the prophet Elishia. Since he did not die, it was prophesized in the book of *Malachi* that Elijah would return to announce "the great and terrible" day of the Lord (Mal. 3:23). John the Baptist appeared in the spirit of Elijah to announce the coming of the Savior to fulfill the prophesy of Malachi.

Since Elijah was taken up into heaven in a fiery chariot, it is customary to bless cars and other means of conveyance on or near his feast day (July 20). We will do so after liturgy today.

begin to be good Christians.

Many people were always with Christ. There were crowds who always wanted something from Him. It was probably quite difficult for these two blind men, mentioned in today's Gospel reading, to approach Jesus. There was only one thing left for them: to cry out loud in order to attract Jesus' attention. And it was because of their insistence, because of their cry, that they got what they asked for. These two blind men turned to Jesus with the words, "Have mercy on us, Son of David!" (Matthew 9:27).

This Gospel passage teaches us constancy in prayer. When we have a request, we turn to God with it. When we see that we are not getting what we want, we may simply retreat. And instead of being persistent in these requests of ours, so that, like these blind men, persistently cry for help, we stop. Very often we do not immediately receive from God what we ask for. This happens so that we can understand whether we really need what we are asking for. Christ touches these people and they receive healing. Christ is able to touch each of us as well. And He touches each of us when we participate in the Holy Liturgy, and especially when we receive the Holy Eucharist. Christ touches our eyes so that we can see. He touches our ears so that we can hear those who need help. He touches our heart – and then we begin to love, we

"The light of the body is the eye. As, therefore, your eye is healthy, your whole body will be bright. And when your eye is evil, your whole body shall be in darkness. If the light that is in you is darkness, then how great the darkness will be!" From these words of Christ, we can conclude that the level of our life depends on our spiritual vision, that is, on the level of our faith. A wise man asked his disciples: "How can you tell when the night ends and the day comes?" The students began to think, but could not find an answer. Then one of them stood up and said, "Probably when you can already distinguish one tree from another, when you can already recognize people." "No," replied the sage. "So how can we recognize it?" the disciples asked the sage. And he said, "When you meet a person and see your brother or sister in their face, it will be a sign that the night has ended and the day has come, that the night of sin has ended in your soul and the light of God's grace has dawned."
