One man was looking for the perfect place on earth. He searched for a long time. And finally, in a distant country, he found a city where he felt comfortable and well. He walked the streets of the city, looked around, admired the landscapes and houses, feeling joy and a desire to stay there forever. Suddenly he got to the cemetery - and was horrified. On each grave, the date of death indicated that these people lived only two or three years, it was written with precision to the hours and minutes lived.

And this man ran as fast as possible from this city. On the square, in the middle of the city, he bumped into an old man and shouted, "How can you? Do you kill your children?" The old man showed him the little book hanging around his neck and said the following words, "When the child reaches maturity, we give him such a book. And every moment, every minute or hour of real happiness in life, each of us notes in this book. After death, all these happy moments are counted. And we get years of true happiness. Here I am 90 years old, but I was actually happy for only three and a half years of my entire life."

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him and said to him: "You of little faith, why did you doubt?" (Matthew 14, 30-31). As we can see, Jesus not only saved his body, but also his soul from perishing in the waves of despair and hopelessness. With the words "You of little faith, why did you doubt?", Christ spiritually supported and strengthened Peter's spirit.

Thomas Wright (N. T. Wright) in one of his popular commentaries, says this about this passage of the Gospel: "The apostles who were sitting in the boat saw many manifestations of the power of Jesus, listened to His sermons and prayed as He taught. Now these skillful fishermen had a hard time: they struggled with their oars, but could hardly make headway against the wind. And today, although we have invented, learned, discovered a lot, we still do not have enough strength, power and knowledge to achieve all that is necessary for us. We have invented a lot of military equipment, but so far, we have not invented such machines that could establish peace on earth. We are ready to send a man to the moon, but we cannot feed the hungry on planet Earth. Our devices allow us to listen to the sounds that whales make in the depths of the ocean, but we are not able to hear the cry of a person who lives on the next street."

Dear believers! We are weak; our forces are weak; we have little living faith capable of working miracles. And there are too many temptations that lead to destruction. And we, like the apostle Peter, drowning in the sea, are drowning in the sea of life. If we begin to look back at the waves, and at the winds, and at the looming threat of death, we, like Peter, will begin to sink. But even then, we should not lose hope: we are given the assurance that, no matter how little our faith in God is, His faith in us is unshakable; however small our love for Him may be, His love for us is boundless. And at the moment when we feel that there is no hope, that we are perishing, if in this last moment we have faith enough to cry out, as Peter cried out: "Lord! I'm drowning! Help me!", He will extend a helping hand to us as well.

A Newly-Recognized Ruthenian Martyr: This past Friday, Pope Francis recognized the martyrdom of Father Petro Paolo Oros, a priest of the Eparchy of Mukačevo, murdered by the Communist authorities on August 28, 1953, shortly after celebrating a Divine Liturgy in secret. The soon-to-be beatified martyr Petro will join the many others, named and unnamed who gave their lives in witness to the faith during the time of the suppression of our church in Europe.

The Dormition Fast: The last fast of the liturgical year continues through August 15, the *Feast of the Dormition of the Theotokos*. This is considered a penitential time in the Metropolia of Pittsburgh. Fasting and other acts of penance are left to the discretion of the individual.

The Feast of the Transfiguration: It is customary to bless the first fruits of the season on the *Feast of the Transfiguration*. Fruit will be blessed after liturgy followed by *mirovanije*.

9th Sunday after Pentecost

Dear brothers and sisters!

Now we live in difficult times, using the example of today's Gospel, the church shows us how to survive these times together with Jesus. In this gospel story, in addition to the description of a historical event from the earthly life of Jesus Christ, a deep mysterious meaning is hidden. Today, the Evangelist Matthew restores before us the night when the disciples were sailing on the lake, and the wind was contrary, and the Lord went to meet them on the water. They saw in the darkness the figure of Him who was walking and cried out in terror.

Let's think about this boat with the apostles, which the Lord sent ahead of Him, and He Himself went to the mountain to pray. The waves throw their boat, they can drown, the night is dark, all around - gloom, water, death and the abyss; they are scared. Isn't that how you and I feel when we experience difficulties, trials and temptations. Sometimes it seems to us that God has abandoned us and we are alone, that life is like complete darkness and there is no way out, that only failures are waiting for us, and in the end, we will go to the bottom and there is no salvation for us... Christ, then and now comes to us and calms us down. On this stormy night, the apostles were even more frightened when they saw Christ. They panicked, thinking it was a dving ghost threatening them with death, and screamed. And then His words were heard amid the noise of the sea: "Be calm, it is I, do not be afraid." Peter, the bravest among all, shouted: "Lord, if it is You, let me go to meet You." Peter wanted to follow Christ, wanted to go, and the Lord approved him. "Go!" he said, and if we want to live according to the Gospel, we will certainly hear the voice of Christ. Go! Go you too, go and don't be afraid, knowing that the waves are raging all around. Peter moved and he had to take a risk, take a step into the abyss, which is in constant motion. Splashes of foam, dark and scary... as if rushing into the void. But he knew that the Lord had taken a step ahead.

Because of Peter's gaze on Christ, the water became a firm foundation under his feet, like the earth. But Peter turned his gaze to the strong wind and turbulent waves, turned his attention away from Christ for a moment, began to care about the waves, thereby weakening his hope in Him and began to sink. But then, when he turned to Jesus again with hope for help, crying out: "Lord, save me!", he was saved from the water. Jesus immediately stretched out his hand, caught
