
Bow and arrows

One courageous warrior, going to war, armed himself only with a bow, but without arrows. They asked him, because he was experienced and knowledgeable in military affairs, why he did such a strange thing.

"Why should I worry about arrows? After all, they will fly from the enemy's side, then I will collect them."

"And if they don't come?" they asked him.
"Then it will be even better. Because there will be no war, death and fear. Peace, brotherhood and love will prevail."

Let's try to pray not only with the mind, but also with the heart, because "God will not despise a humble and contrite heart" (Ps. 50.19). Let us not despair and not complain, even when the Lord is not in a hurry to fulfill our request. Because the Lord, the guide of the heart, knows better than us when to fulfill our request. From the Holy Scriptures and from the history of the Church, we know that some righteous people fasted and prayed and asked God for the fulfillment of their covenant and holy desires for many years. For example, how long Sarah prayed that God would give her a son. And she gave birth to him in old age. The righteous Zacharias and his wife Elizabeth prayed a lot, and their barrenness was resolved even at the end of the years. The holy and righteous Forefathers Joachim and Anna prayed and fasted and gave alms for 50 years, and in the end the Lord gave them a daughter – the Most Holy Theotokos. Dear believers! Thomas Wright comments on this passage: "The point, of course, is not in the 'size' of faith, but in God to Whom it is addressed. If you want to see the moon, it doesn't matter what size your window is. You will not see anything even from the largest window if it faces the wrong side, but the smallest crack on the right side is enough to see the moon." And in order for this faith to be addressed to the true God, a lot of prayer and fasting is needed in order to free oneself from incorrect ideas about Him, and to be able to accept the grace of Him Who, according to the final words of today's reading, was delivered into the hands of the people who killed Him, but on the third day He rose again (cf. Mt 17.22).

10th Sunday after Pentecost

Dear brothers and sisters!

The today's Gospel tells us about God's healing grace, the weakness of the demon-possessed boy, the weakness of the faith of the apostles and the zeal of the prayer of a loving father. The young man's father told the Savior about his son's illness: "On the full moon he is raging and suffers grievously" (Mt. 17.15), "the spirit throws him to the ground, and he foams and gnashes his teeth, becomes wooden... Many times, the spirit threw him into fire and into water to destroy him (Mk. 9.18,22), and retreats from him by force, wearing him out" (Lk. 9.39).

The father asked the Lord for mercy He would have mercy on the upset father and wanting to see in him faith in the gracious miraculous power, answered him: "...If you have even a little faith, then everything is possible to a believer. And at the same time, the young man's father cried out with tears: I believe, Lord! Help my lack of faith!" (Mk. 9.23-24). The Lord rebuked the unclean spirit and said: "I command you, come out of him and do not enter him again" (Mk. 9.25), and the unclean spirit left the young man.

Saint John Chrysostom teaches that when someone prays and fasts, he has two wings that are lighter than the wind, because there is no one stronger than a person who sincerely fasts and prays.

Saint Philaret says: "If fasting is necessary for the apostles, then it is necessary for us as well. If fasting helps miracle workers, then we too, whose body often fights against the soul, should not reject its help. Fasting and prayer strengthen our faith, hope and love, and connects us with God. Prayer makes the impossible possible, the unfavorable profitable, the difficult easy. The Apostle James teaches us that the sincere prayer of the righteous can do much (James 5.16). The Holy Fathers and Teachers of the Church call prayer "the mother of all virtues."

Our Lord Jesus Christ teaches us: "Whatever you ask in prayer, believe that you will receive it and it will be fulfilled for you. And when you stand at prayer, forgive if you have anything against anyone, so that your Heavenly Father may also forgive you your sins" (Mk. 11.24-25). Prayer without faith and without attention is like a censer without incense, or a body without a soul. The Apostle Paul teaches us: "Pray without ceasing! Give thanks to God for everything, because this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus" (1 Thessalonians 5.17-18).
