Copper kettle of Christianity

This happened in Bible school. One woman said that she recently noticed something strange in the basement. There, in the darkest corner, a potato sprouted. At first, the woman had no idea where the light was falling on the plant. And then she noticed that a polished copper kettle was hanging on a hook near the basement window. The sun's rays, reflecting off it, fell on the potatoes.

The woman concluded: "When I saw that reflection, it occurred to me: let me not become a preacher or a teacher capable of explaining all the nuances of the Holy Scriptures. But at least I can be a kind of copper kettle of Christianity, that is, catch the rays of the Son of God and reflect His light on those who are in a dark corner."

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people engaged in life's problems, who are at work, earning a living for themselves and their families.

Jesus' call is preceded by His look directed at the two brothers. Jesus looks at them with a look of love and deep trust. This view is directed at specific persons.

Saint Maximus of Turin wrote: By faith, Peter casts the nets of Christ's science. As you probably understand, the Lord spoke about spiritual fishing, however, Peter says: "Teacher, we worked all night and caught nothing, but at Your word I will let down the nets." It is the same as if he said: "We fished all night and caught nothing and worked in vain. Now I will no longer catch with nets, but with grace, not with efforts for a profession, but with perseverance for a vocation." When Peter casts his nets for the Word, thus he casts the teaching of Christ. When he unfolds the densely woven and well-ordered webs at the Master's command, he unfolds the words in the Savior's name in an appropriate and clear manner. With these words, he is able to save not creatures, but souls. "We worked all night," he says, "and didn't catch anything." Peter, who previously could not see how to fish properly, living in darkness without Christ, really worked all night. But when the Savior's light shone upon him, the darkness dissipated, and through his faith he saw in the depths what he could never have seen with his own eyes. (Maximus of Turin, Sermon 110.2).

"Sail to the depths!" - these words of Jesus Christ, once spoken to the apostle Peter, are also a call for every person on a daily basis. We live in a world. We take care of many different things. We look at everything that happens around us. We think about various aspects of our human life, be it political, economic or cultural, and it causes us a feeling of anxiety. The needs of modern people are infinitely great, because the perspectives of living spaces are opening up. The desire for thrills encourages travel, search, conquest and victory. But it often happens that, despite considerable efforts, abandoned nets of desires turn out to be almost empty. The best technique does not guarantee a successful "catch"; although the nets are cast wide, the results are insufficient, and the compromised daily choices do not give a ray of hope. We care about it because it is very close to our daily existence.

Our Christian vocation is an experience of God. This is the friendship that arises between God and His people. In order to know the Lamb of God, it is not enough for us to simply come, see and follow Him, we need to find Him, surrender to Him, and trust Him at the same time. "You wouldn't be looking for Me if you hadn't already found Me," says Christ to St. Augustine. Dear believers! There are various ways of salvation. All true Christians receive one Spirit, serve one Lord, hope in one Savior, believe in one truth and obey one Law. However, each conversion is individual for God, each Christian has his or her own experience. The Holy Spirit acts in each person at His discretion. He calls everyone exactly as He sees fit.

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Protection of the Theotokos: This Friday, October 1, is the _Feast of the Protection of the Theotokos_. This feast commemorates in the year 911 when the city of Constantinople was under siege by the still-pagan Russians. On October 1 of that year, people were gathered in Blachernae, the church dedicated to the Mother of God, when St. Andrew, the Fool for Christ, saw the Theotokos appear above the city and spread her mantle over it as a sign of her protection. That night a great storm developed and drove the Russians away. This feast reminds us that even in the most distressing and dangerous of times, the Mother of God is always there to offer her protection. Liturgy will be celebrated at Patronage Church at 4 PM followed by their Crab Feast.

Our Daily Bread: Patronage will be continuing to participate in donating Casseroles for "Our Daily Bread", a Catholic Charities facility in Baltimore which serves 250,000 hot meals each year to homeless and needy persons. Our Daily Bread relies on churches to help with this important mission by supplying premade casseroles. The casseroles are due October 2nd. How it works:

- If you are able to donate your time, ingredients and supplies (pans will be available at Patronage in the kitchen) you would take pans home and prepare the casseroles per the recipes supplied
- -Please use $\frac{1}{2}$ size aluminum pan, which is 10x12 inches and 29/16 inches deep.
- -The casseroles need to be dropped off at Patronage (put in the freezer at Patronage) and then they will be delivered (frozen) to Our Daily Bread
- -Please Cover the tray completely with aluminum foil and FREEZE (NO plastic wrap)

16th Sunday after Pentecost

Dear brothers and sisters!

The initiative to call disciples belongs to Jesus himself. It is not the disciples who find a teacher for themselves – as was accepted at that time – but Jesus himself chooses and calls his disciples. This calling can be seen reaching back to the tradition of the Old Testament, which describes the calling of Elisha by the prophet Elijah (1 Kings 19:19-21).

Jesus called Simon, whom he renamed Peter, and Andrew, his brother. Jesus personally directs His invitation to these two fishermen brothers. Simon lived in Capernaum. His brother Andrew, according to the Evangelist Mark (cf. Mark 1:29), also lived in Capernaum, while according to the Evangelist John (cf. 1,35-49) he came from Bethsaida. For some time, he was a disciple of John the Baptist. Jesus finds these people at work, casting nets into the Sea of Galilee. He calls
