"Then the journalist who interviewed asked how to solve this problem? The answer was just as simple: It is necessary to intervene in life. Do something good for another.

There are many people around us who need our help. They are everywhere you look. Usually, a person finds what he or she is looking for. What do you see around you?

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by the Savior show his omnipotence, and also confirm people in the faith of both the personal Resurrection of Jesus Christ and the future universal resurrection of the dead: "For if we are united with Him in the likeness of His death, then we must be united in the likeness of the resurrection" (Rom. 6.5). There is an opinion that Christ took pity on the widow, because in her he also saw his Mother - the Holy Mother of God, who very soon, being a widow, will also lose her Son and our Savior.

Saint Ephraim the Syrian, describing the meeting of Christ and the deceased, says: "The Son of the Virgin came out to meet the widow's son and was like a handkerchief for the widow's tears, and for the deceased son - his life. Death withdrew to its place, turning back before the Victor." Blessed Theophylact of Bulgaria interprets it this way: "The dead man, having risen, sat down and began to speak, so that no one would think that this was a vision. After all, the fact that he sat down and began to speak was a sign of true resurrection. A body without a soul can neither sit nor speak."

This is what the apostle Paul says about this: "For none of us lives to himself, and no one dies to himself; and whether we live - we live for the Lord; or if we die - we die for the Lord; and therefore, whether we live or die, we are always the Lord's" (Rom. 14:7-8). If the goal of a person's life is God, who loves us, then every single person can say that there is someone and something to live for, to love. Because when there is someone in the world, even far away, who loves us, then our life never loses its meaning.

Dear believers! Listening to today's Gospel reading and reflecting on it, let's remember both our departure from this temporary life and the words of consolation "don't cry". Let's remember the compassion that should live in our heart. Because kindness and compassion are the cure for indifference.

Let's say words of sympathy more often – now there are a lot of people in need of this word of consolation, and let's voice them both to people who lose loved ones and to those who are in difficulties in life. Our word will not bring the person back, but it will give the other person hope and the realization that they are not alone, that someone else is also empathizing. And these seemingly simple words give hope and consolation.

### 18 Sunday after Pentecost

Dear brothers and sisters!

How did the resurrection of Nain's widow's son happen? The Savior touches the funeral bier. The procession stops. People immediately understand that something extraordinary is happening, because no self-respecting Jew would want to touch a stretcher with a dead body on it in order not to be defiled. Then the Savior tells the young man in a commanding voice: "Stand up!"

There were no similar situations in the history of the Old Testament, when a person resurrected the dead with his authority, his word. The young man stands up and begins to speak. As the evangelist continues, great fear gripped everyone; everyone praised God and gave thanks for the fact that the great prophet had risen.

What conclusion should we draw from today's Gospel reading? The conclusion is very simple - the Lord is especially close to us not when we are comfortable, not when there is, in general, no acute need for His active participation in our lives. And precisely when, it would seem, the irreparable happens, when a person in his life story gets into a dead end and understands that there doesn't seem to be a way out.

And at this very moment, when the soul opens and becomes able to accept the action of God, at this very moment the Lord comes, changes the situation in such a way that it is sometimes difficult for us to imagine it.

Great saints thanked God when sorrows and misfortunes came to them. They saw in these seemingly unnecessary and superfluous problems the great mercy and visitation of God. They understood that in this way God was answering their request for strengthening of faith, for strengthening of prayer.

Holy Fathers, in particular St. Cyril of Alexandria note that when performing this miracle, Christ was the first to approach the funeral procession and stop it: "No one asked Him to bring the dead back to life, but He does it on His own initiative." Why? Because the miracles performed
