The Parable of the Sower

Dear brothers and sisters!

Today, on this Sunday, our Church offers for our attention the Gospel reading from which we hear how the Lord told His listeners the parable of the sower. It should be noted that the Savior often taught the people with parables and instructive stories.

A sower went out to sow grain, and when he sowed, one fell by the wayside, and was trampled, and the birds of the air pecked at it. Another fell on stony ground, where there was little earth, it rose, but soon dried up, because there was not enough moisture and roots. Another seed fell beside a thorn, but a thorn grew up and choked it. Also, there was such a grain that fell on good ground, and when it came up, it bore fruit a hundredfold. After finishing the parable, the Lord said: "...he who has ears to hear, let him listen!" (Luke 8:8).

Grain is the word of God. Earth is the human heart. Under the ground by the road should be understood people who are inattentive; the word of God does not have access to their hearts. The enemy of the human race easily steals and carries it away from them, so that these people do not believe and are not saved. Under stony soil should be understood people who are unstable and weak-hearted. They willingly listen to the word of God, but it is not strengthened in their souls, and such people fall away from the faith at the first temptation or sorrow or persecution of the Word of God. There are also such people whose worldly cares, wealth and various vices drown out the Word of God in their souls. They symbolize a thorn. Good fertile soil means people with a good heart. They listen attentively to the Word of God, diligently keep it in their souls, and patiently seek to fulfill all that it teaches.

Saint Theophilus the Confessor, Archbishop of Bulgaria, teaches: "He came out of the bosom of the Father, from invisibility, and became visible. He who always sows came out. Because the Son of God does not stop always sowing in our souls. The Lord sows through preachers who proclaim the truth, not their own, but inspired by the Spirit of Truths, sowing the seeds of the saving teaching of Christ. The apostles sent by the savior to preach went all over the world announcing the Gospel of the Kingdom to all creation. They did not announce their own teaching, but announced to everyone the Divine teaching, announced to them by the Lord Himself, who guided them to all truth, making them mystics. The work of the preaching of Christ's apostles was continued by the holy martyrs and confessors, who glorified the crucified and risen Christ not only with their prayers, but also with their pious deeds. Their banner was taken up by the saints of Christ, the holy fathers and teachers of the Church... the holy and the
