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The thought of Christ, the soft Light, is naturally called forth at the sight of the sunset and the mellow light of the lamps. Christ, by the Godhead, is an ever-existing Light, as He is the eternal Brightness of the Father, and the express Image of His Being. But for the salvation of humankind, He concealed His Divine Glory beneath the form of a man, and in this way He became the soft light of the evening. A comparison very striking!

The haze that generally fills the evening air lessens the brightness of the sunlight. In the daytime the light of the sun is unbearable, so that one cannot look at it with an unarmed eye. But at the same sun in the evening, and see how softly it shines, everyone may look on it plainly, admire its beauty... And thus it is that the Son of God, unapproachable according to His Divinity, has made Himself accessible to us by His humanity, through which the Light of the Godhead had lessened so that we could see the Word of Life with plain eyes... *St. Sebastian Dabovich*

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The man went from Jerusalem to Jericho. On this road, he was severely beaten and robbed by bandits. After some time, a priest and a Levite were walking along the same road. Seeing the injured man, they passed by. At first glance, the priest and the Levite did not do anything bad to the victim, but nor they did do anything good.

The priest and the Levite justified their refusal to help the victim, because they observed the rite of purity. The Jewish law forbade touching the dead or even blood, because whoever did this became unclean and could not pray until the ritual of purification had been completed. However, the reason for their refusal lies in something else – their self-love. While maintaining religious purity, the priest and the Levite were actually thinking about themselves, about their own good and glory, rather than about God and their neighbors, or even the good of their souls. Instead, the Samaritan, whom the Jews despised, turned out to be more pious and closer to God, because he thought and cared about the victim.

The story of the Samaritan reminds us what a true sacrifice and love for God is: that only a sincere prayer will be heard by God: "A sacrifice to God is a contrite spirit: God will not despise a contrite and humble heart " (Ps. 50: 19).

When looking for friends, people naturally choose good people, people who share their interests and preferences, people with whom it is easy to communicate, with whom it is pleasant to spend time, and from whom we hope to receive some good. However, God created everyone out of love and loves everyone equally, not according to external signs, and he wants all people to be his friends: "I call you friends, because I have declared to you everything that I heard from my Father " (Jn. 15:15. Christ suffered and died for all in order to save all, to make everyone a partaker of his heavenly joy: "God shows his love for us by the fact that Christ died for us while we were still sinners " (Romans 5:8). "God wants all people to be saved and to come to an understanding of the truth" (1 Tim. 2:4).

Our life is like a boomerang. The harder you throw, the stronger it will come back. One little boy in a fit of anger shouted to his mother: "I don't love you!" The mother was a smart woman and told her son to go and shout about it in the yard (and they lived in a mountain valley). The boy ran into the valley and shouted: "I don't love you!" The echo answered: "I don't love you!" He ran to his mother and says that there is a bad boy hiding in the valley who is shouting that he does not love me. The mother said, "Go and tell him that you love him." The boy ran out and shouted: "I love you!" And the echo answered back: "I love you!" Our words and actions are like an echo – what we say and do returns to us. What a man sows, that shall he reap.

Dear Believers! The lawyer who asked Christ, "And who is my neighbor?", received much more than he asked for. With the words of a parable, Jesus explained to him not only who is our neighbor, but also showed how we should love our neighbors and help them in their need, regardless of who that person is. Therefore, following the example of Christ, let us try to serve everyone sincerely and in love, let us unite and draw closer to Christ. And the Lord will draw near to us, and generously bless us with the knowledge and understanding of God's truth, the gifts of the Holy Spirit, understanding of each other, and the fullness of the happiness of the children of our heavenly Father.

Phillip's Fast/Christmas Lent: Tomorrow, November 14 is the feast of the Apostle Phillip, which is 40 days before the *Nativity of Our Lord*, therefore the fast for Christmas begins at sundown on this day. While there is no obligation to fast during this time, as during Great Lent, this is still considered a penitential time in the Metropolia of Pittsburgh. The faithful are asked to observe the fast in the best way possible.

Patronage Food Festival: Upcoming dates for the festival are Wednesday, November 16 at 9 am for kolachi making; Friday, November 18 at 9 am for festival preparation/potato peeling; and Saturday, November 19 at 9 am for the festival. Bishop's Appeal: By now, all parishioners should have received information on this year's Appeal.
