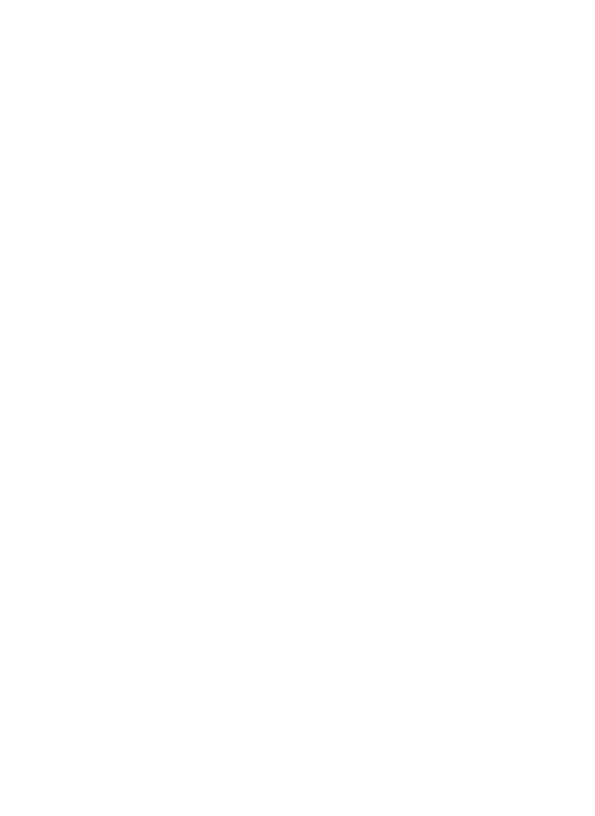



Dear brothers and sisters!

The healing of ten lepers by Jesus illuminates an important theme of spiritual life - gratitude, being able to thank God and neighbors for every good thing.

A very poor but capable boy studied in one town. His poor mother gave her last money to give her son a proper education. The time has come and the young man successfully graduated from the high school. Relatives of students were present during the presentation of certificates in the high school. Among them was the poorly dressed mother of this young man. A solemn moment had come: this young man was awarded a "Gold Medal" for his special success in studies. After accepting this award, he excitedly said that he would like to see this medal on the chest of the one to whom it rightfully belonged. After that, he left the stage, approached his mother, kissed her and attached a medal to her old clothes. Everyone present was pleasantly surprised, and many of them simply could not hold back tears, seeing the happiness of the poor mother. Gratitude is not just a feeling, satisfaction with a received gift, but a manifestation of our faith, which testifies to the understanding of how great is the love of Jesus for us and our love for God. "Nothing is so pleasing to God as a grateful soul," said Saint Ivan Zolotousty. It is impossible to take from one person and pass on to another one's way of experiencing the connection of faith, love, trust with God. A person must come to this on his own. Only a personal encounter with Christ, like that of the Samaritan, gives rise to faith, love, trust,
