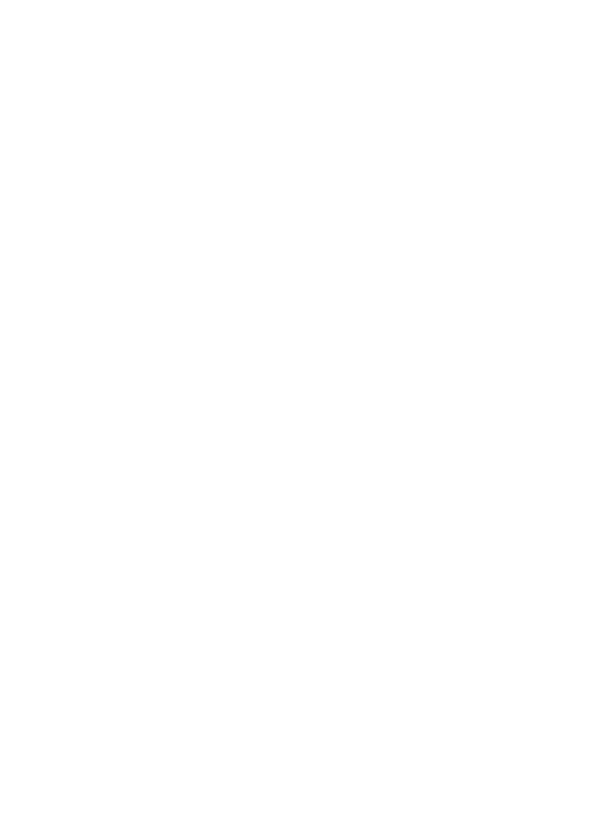

The Vigil of Christmas is traditionally a day of fast, which is the reason for the foods eaten at the Holy Supper on that day. However, we refrain from fasting on Saturdays, except for Holy Saturday to honor the Old Testament Sabbath and never fast on Sunday because it is the Day of Resurrection. Since Christmas Eve falls on a Saturday this year, the custom is to eat the Holy Supper on Friday, December 23.

#### **Sunday Before Christmas**

Dear brothers and sisters!

Today we stand on the threshold of a great celebration - the birth of Jesus Christ. Christ came close to us by becoming a man so that we could be close to Him here on earth. Nothing became an obstacle for Jesus: neither the poor Bethlehem cave, nor the human body, nor the persecution of Herod, nor the opposition of the Pharisees. He comes from heaven to us and once again give us His love, the happiness that man & woman had in paradise and lost through the firstborn sin.

So that the birth of Jesus Christ is not in vain, fruitless for us, let us remove from our souls everything that can become an obstacle for His love to come to us. Let us often remind ourselves of His words: "Come, blessed of my Father, inherit the Kingdom that has been prepared for you from the creation of the world. For I was hungry, and you gave me food; I was thirsty and you gave me drink; I was a stranger, and you accepted me; naked and you clothed me; sick, and you visited me; I was in prison, and you came to me."

At the Vespers of this Sunday, the Church reflects on the Nativity of Christ with the following words: "So let us now prepare ourselves in spirit and hurry to meet with clean eyes and good deeds the one who by His miraculous birth wanted to come to His people. He is born in Bethlehem, so that we, deprived of heavenly life, out of His mercy, will be brought back to it." Christians often think of Jesus exclusively as a historical figure of the past, or as someone who will play some important role in the future. Instead, we rarely think of Christ in the present tense - as Emmanuel, "God with us." How much we need "God with us" in these days of confusion, darkness and strife. In the Gospel of John, it is said: "And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us" (1:14). Jesus is with us when we fall -- to pick us up. With us in weakness -- to give us strength.

One famous surgeon bows his head and prays before each operation. Seeing this once, a surprised journalist asked him: "Do you always pray before an operation?" The doctor replied with a smile: "Always. Because I never know what to expect and when I have to hand the scalpel to the Great Physician and ask Him to continue. Many times, in my practice it was like this, when I was at the edge of my human capabilities, and God took "everything into His own hands".

In order for Christ to be born in our heart, it is necessary to prepare a place for Him there. Therefore, another word that can be used to describe today is the word "Preparation", especially for us New Testament Christians. When we expect a dear guest, we prepare long and carefully for his arrival, and the more important the guest, the bigger and more thorough our preparations.
