"ASK THE DEACON" – THIS WEEK'S QUESTION: Why do we put our three fingers together while blessing ourselves and why do we go to the right shoulder first then the left when blessing ourselves?

ANSWER: The three fingers together signify the Holy Trinity, the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit; the remaining two fingers held against the palm signify the two natures, divine and human, in the one person, Jesus the Son. These are signs of the two fundamental dogmas of our faith. When the priest makes the Sign of the Cross in giving a blessing, the movement he makes is from left to right. This is also the way the deacon makes the sign of the Cross with the Holy Gifts at the elevation. When the priest goes from left to right while facing us in giving the blessing, however, and we **follow** his movement making the Sign of the Cross on ourselves, we first go to the right and then the left.
