**DEAR BELIEVERS:** In connection with the death of Bishop Milan, we cannot fail to mention the active participation in the life of the church, inter-church relations, and a stable pastoral position on important socio-political issues. Bishop Milan was an example of a man who loved Christ, and His Church, and showed this love through acts of charity for each of us. During his 18 years of episcopal ministry in the Greek Catholic Diocese of Mukachevo, Bishop Milan consecrated 156 priests. Under his leadership, more than 250 new temples and chapels were built. He was fluent in six languages. In his will, Bishop Milan bequeathed all his property to the Mukachevo diocese. He asked, "Dress me in the old episcopal vestments. Put a wooden scepter in my left hand, and remove the golden episcopal ring from my right hand and place the rosary in my hand. Put some old miter in my grave that you will not mind. Also, bury me in the crypt of the Uzhhorod Cathedral near the Blessed Martyr Theodore Romzha." Thanks to his zealous work in God's vineyard, Bishop Milan did not leave our Byzantine Catholic Diocese in the United States in great difficulty. He delegated many missionaries to missionary work throughout the United States. We pray that the good deeds instituted by Bishop Milan, with the blessing and help of the Holy Spirit, may be poured out with abundant graces on the Church of Christ. May the merciful Lord embrace him and grant him the Kingdom of Heaven!

# **ANNUAL ST. NICHOLAS PILGRIMAGE AND THE ALTAR SERVER RETREAT CONGRESS:** Due to COVID-19 concerns, this year's retreat has been, unfortunately, cancelled.

#### "ASK THE DEACON" - THIS WEEK'S QUESTION: What is the significance of the bells on the kadilo?

**ANSWER:** On a fine point first, as noted in last week's answer, kadilo means the incense itself. The traditional bells are on the kadil'nitsa (censer/thurible). Our liturgical books do not say anything about these bells. One of those books called for short the *Ordo* only says, "The thurible has short chains so that it may be swung at full length more easily." In one English edition (the *Ordo* is in Latin), a note adds "The *Ordo* does not mention it, but in many places, it is common to have small bells on the chains of the thurible." So, my answer here is conjecture. As with the topic of the church bell(s), these small bells are another call to worship. They direct our attention in an audible way to the rite of incensing. Our Byzantine worship is very sensual, that is, it engages all of our senses. In this case, added to our smelling the incense, and seeing the smoke, and the censer being swung, we all hear it also.
